



Hampshire and the Islands Historic Churches Trust Ride and Stride

As the clock shows 9.55 on Saturday 8th September I leave the house armed with photocopied sheets from my Portsmouth A-Z and the list of churches Lintend to visit.

My target is all 13 churches participating in the Ride and Stride event on Portsea Island.

First on my list was Church of the Holy Spirit off Fawcett Road, my own Parish church and sometimes polling station. This huge brick church, originally St Matthew's and built 1903-24 was gutted in 1941. It was restored 1956-8. I was greeted by their new vicar and signed in as their first visitor.

I was down the list at my next stop; Trinity Methodist in Albert Street, only recently emerged from under scaffolding following restoration of the tower and essential conservation work. It has a beautiful wooden interior and a very lofty tower. Then a quick stride down St. Ronan's Road to St. Simon's described as "a piebald church in red and yellow brick" (Rodney Hubbuck) dating from 1866-1868.

I now needed to get to the Cathedral so looked for the nearest bus stop. I have lived in Southsea for 5 years and there have been very few changes to the bus routes in that time so I was really flummoxed when I couldn't find the no.1. I settled for the newly





re-routed no.3 to take me to Palmerston Road from where I walked to the Cathedral. They were having a Heritage Day and no doubt visitors were learning that the church dates back to c.1157, served from Southwick Priory until the Dissolution of the monasteries.

The time on the Cathedral clock says 11am and Jean has to arrive at St. Faith's by midday but with another church in between. Will she make it on time? Find out next month.

WHO'S WHO?

A Verger (in brief)

"More than once recently I have been called "the lady who rings the bell at the church".



I really don't mind being recognised around Bedhampton as such, and that description is probably better than that of Alice Tinker, the verger from The Vicar of Dibley; but maybe the real role of verger should be explained a little more fully. Firstly, I should say that I am not THE verger – I am <u>a</u> verger and Alec is the Head Verger who hopefully will agree with all I explain here!

Historically Vergers were responsible for the order and upkeep of the house of worship, including the care of the buildings, furnishings and sacred relics, preparations for the services, grave digging etc. (not a lot has changed there then). I suppose in simpler terms he could be classed as the caretaker. Some years ago I had the pleasure of looking after an elderly visiting clergyman who expressed genuine surprise that I wasn't living in a "tied" house or indeed was not on the payroll of the church, for in days gone by the verger would have been so rewarded.

When I was a child we lived near a church and it was common to see a very tall, lean man, walking the roads in flowing black robes (the verger). In fact I never remember seeing him without his robe. I was a little intimidated by him – the black made him very severe and he was at most of the services keeping order if the children tried to take advantage of our blind vicar. Alec wears a similar black gown. I decided not to "gown up" when I was presented with a blue gown, making me look like the back of a Swindon Corporation bus! I never saw Mr. Leonard with a virge but that is the rod (or staff) which a verger would carry to escort dignitaries of the church. We have a virge at St. Thomas' and Alec headed the procession carrying the virge when the Bishop visited recently. In olden days it might have been used to keep back animals or an overenthusiastic crowd.

At St. Thomas' Alec and I carry out our duties with pride. We prepare the church for its various services, making sure everything is in place for the rector or visiting priest to take the service. We are lucky to have Paddy Williams to launder our altar linen and during the interregnum were complimented by visiting clergy from The Cathedral on the pristine order of the cloth. There is a particular order for each different service and I think Alec and I know what is needed for each one. There are also different coloured drapes to put on the altar for special parts of the ecclesiastical year. Changing the colours takes quite a time but is a satisfying job.

The Head Verger has the task of writing rotas for brass cleaning and one for the small group of people who come into the church each week to give it a clean. ... and here I might say that if there is anyone who would like to join any of the rotas or who is interested in the vergering team, please contact Alec, we need your help!

So, apart from the services mentioned above, we are vergers for funeral services and weddings and the latter is when you will hear the church bell ringing and when we try to encourage it to make a joyful sound (it might be me doing the encouraging)!

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'In Flanders Fields the poppies blow'

Part 8 of a monthly series on the men of Bedhampton who lost their lives in World War 2 and whose names appear on the War Memorial in St. Thomas' or in the graveyard.

Rex George (1924-1944)

Royal Marine 45 Commando

Rex was born in Maidstone, Kent in 1924, the second son of Arthur and Clara George. Of his siblings, James was born in 1922, Alan 1926 and Jeffery in 1930. His father worked as a Builder and Painter, and according to the 1939 National Register, had a 90% war disability which prevented him from doing anything on the home front. In 1939 the George family

were living at 35, Park Lane, Bedhampton.

Rex became a member of the famous No 45 Commando which operated in many of the great battles of 1944 and 1945. They participated in Operation Overlord, better known as the D day landings and when the allies broke out of their bridgehead, continued to harass the enemy as they were driven back across the Rhine in 1945. Rex had a distinguished if tragically short career with No. 45 Commando. He was mentioned is despatches. On 20th August 1944, aged just 20, he was killed in action against the enemy. He was later buried at Ranville War Cemetery, situated about 10 km from the city of Caen.

JOYCE CLARK

A remarkable life

Many people may not know about the life that Joyce had. The middle of three sisters, growing up in 1930's London. Her children, John and Tracey, grew up listening to tales of the war, her evacuation to Cornwall and the school that was bombed at lunchtime on a day when Joyce stayed home sick.

Shortly after the war, Joyce met Ron Forsdyke, a dashing former RAF officer. They had to save ration vouchers for their wedding cake, and the company catering the reception went bust days before the ceremony. Ron had left the RAF and joined the

diplomatic corps, and Joyce travelled with her husband to the consulate in Prague. At this time Russia was threatening to invade Czechoslovakia, so Prague was a dangerous place to be. When Joyce discovered she was pregnant she returned home to ensure that John was born in Britain. Ron then returned home and rejoined the RAF. Sadly he was tragically killed in a plane crash when John was three years old.

Widowed or not, life was tough for a single mother in the 1950's. Of necessity Joyce worked for several years as a housekeeper for a cantankerous old man in Eltham. then managed against the odds to secure a job in the Westminster Bank in Lothbury, London, a mortgage in her own name and was able buy a home for herself and John in Chislehurst.

Joyce's elder sister, Pat, met and married a Kiwi soldier called Wally, then moved to New Zealand. Later Joyce's parents and younger sister, Kathleen, also moved to New Zealand but Joyce decided against following them. Pat and Wally raised a family there. Joyce missed her family a great deal but she did manage to travel to New Zealand twice later in life.

Joyce enjoyed amateur dramatics and it was this that led her to join Eltham Little Theatre, where she met Roy, who was to become her second husband, and they had their daughter Tracy together. The family moved with Roy's work to Portsmouth in 1970, and settled in Bedhampton, moving to Purbrook a short time before Roy's sudden death in 1989.

For many years Joyce was part of the local community, joining the church choir, Townswomen's Guild, including their dramatic group, WI, Young Wives and Mothers Union. Following Roy's death she struggled to learn to drive a car, having to retake the test several times; however persistence paid off and she was to volunteer with Meals on Wheels for the WRVS.

During this time, Joyce travelled to New Zealand twice to be reunited with her family and attend her niece Alison's wedding. She also stared down cancer for the first time in 1995, beating a leukaemia that she wasn't expected to survive. She also welcomed her granddaughter, Kinsey into the family in 1990.

In the last few years, Joyce was happy to see both John and Tracy happily married and settled, and I am sure she drew comfort from this. She was to have more battles with cancer, however, initially a skin cancer on her face was removed, then she discovered the tumour in her tummy area for which she had radiotherapy, which appeared successful. Joyce started to have falls and despite her wish to be independent, in February 2017, she had to concede that she needed more support and asked to go into The Lodge care home in Bedhampton, when the cancer returned again and Joyce ended her life peacefully, in the company of family.

Joyce touched the lives of many people in such a positive way, and the world is richer for her having been a part of it.



Wordsearch The Poor Man's Farl

Think of Piccadilly Circus, and that small statue of the angel poised with bow and arrow. Most people think it stands for Eros. It is in fact a memorial to the greatest Christian Victorian philanthropist. politician and social reformer of his generation – Lord Shaftesbury. Anthony Ashley Cooper, the 7th Earl of Shaftesbury (1801 – 1885) was a devout Christian Member of Parliament who spent his life fighting to help ease the miserable conditions in lunatic asylums, to stop the practice of forcing young children to be chimney sweeps, to stop children working in factories below the age of 10. to stop women and children going in the mines at all, to stop opium addiction, and to provide Ragged Schools for children without any means of education.

On the day of his funeral at Westminster Abbey, tens of thousands of poor Londoners thronged the streets to see his coffin go by. He was much loved as The Poor Man's Earl.
