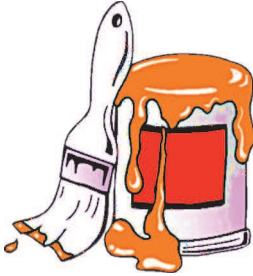

This year we are forming a festival choir and I know it will be great fun, but even if I could, I would hesitate to join them. "His singing although out of tune is enthusiastic." Those were the words on a school report from my childhood. From then on I became the lad in the family who could not sing. So when I see notices like the one above, I know that I could not possibly do it. Despite loving to sing that is not me, after all, I am the one who sings enthusiastically but out of tune. As labels go, the out of tune Rector is not the worst, but what other labels do we allow to impact what God calls us to do? The single mum, the practical one, the academic one, old, young. What labels stop us trying things?

Jesus used twelve people, who were at the bottom of life's list of labels, to create a worldwide movement that has positively impacted millions of people. Sir Winston Churchill was labelled as naughty and weak with no ambition, yet led us to freedom. And this month we remember those he led and the impact that they and others have had down the years. With their own labels and their own doubts, they died defending our right to live free. When I remember the sacrifice those who have died made for me and you, I am reminded that I should grab every opportunity to live life to the full, despite my doubts and labels.

It's a similar sacrifice that Jesus made for you and me as he died for us upon the cross. A sacrifice that says, cast your labels adrift, and live life to the full, not just in the future but in the here and now. Jesus re-labelled us all as being sons and daughters of a God with all the gifts we need to live life, and life to the full.

'Child of God', that is a label worth living with.

History of Churches in Portsmouth.

Originally, there were only 2 churches on Portsea Island, St Mary's, and St Thomas, now the Cathedral. Due to the growth in population from the early 1800s, many more churches were built, although some have since closed, been converted, or for various reasons no longer exist.

It was now 11.15am and time was running out as I needed to get to St Faith's by 12pm and I still had St John's RC Cathedral to visit. Bus 21 took me close to the Cathedral but as the registration was in a hall at the rear I had no chance to see inside this "large and big-boned building" (Hubbuck).



From there I hotfooted it to the area where I knew St Faith's to be. It was cunningly hidden in a corner and I only found it, by asking, with 5 minutes to spare. (St Faith's is a short walk north from Tesco's in Commercial Road.)

In my rush to get to St Faith's I had missed out All Saints where my mother was confirmed in the 1930s.



All Saints was built in the 1820s by Thomas Owen who is responsible for so many lovely buildings on the Island. It has an impressive interior and was his first and best ecclesiastical building, according to Hubbuck. (to be concluded next month).

The Honeypot Children's Charity's vision is for every child to make the most of their once chance at childhood and the charity provides residential respite breaks and ongoing outreach support for young carers and vulnerable children age 5-12. Children like 'Tom', who wakes 2 or 3 times a night to check his mum is OK and still breathing and he is only 5 years old. The majority of children that Honeypot supports are young carers, who work incredibly hard to provide care and emotional support for a loved one. Honeypot also supports vulnerable children, who may have witnessed domestic violence, experienced homelessness or live in extremely deprived areas.

Honeypot supports over 1000 children a year from Honeypot House in the New Forest, where the children come every year for a weekend full of fun, taking a break from caring, making friends and creating memories to cherish. ARMISTICE DAY and REMEMBRANCE (Poppy) DAY

The total number of military and civilian casualties in World War I was around 40 million. There were 20 million deaths and 21 million wounded. The total number of deaths includes 9.7 million military personnel and about 10 million civilians.

World War II was the deadliest in military history in absolute terms of total casualties. Close to 80 million people were killed, which was about 3% of the 1940 world population. This includes deaths from war-related disease and famine.

Civilians killed totalled 50 million, including 19 to 28 million from war-related disease and famine. Military deaths from all causes totalled 21 to 25 million, including deaths in captivity of about 5 million prisoners of war.

November 11th, 1918. The first Armistice Day.

The armistice was signed at five o'clock on this morning, and hostilities ceased on all fronts at 11 am the same day. Armistice Day is observed across many nations to commemorate the soldiers who fought in World War I. Specifically, it refers to the armistice treaty signed by the Allies and Germany at Compiègne, France. The truce went into effect on the eleventh day of the eleventh month at the eleventh hour to end the war. However, in the hours between the announcement of the armistice and its enforcement deadline, fighting continued. Almost 3,000 men died on the last day of the war.

Records show that the last British soldier killed in World War One was Private George Edwin Ellison of the 5th Royal Irish Lancers. He was killed at Mons (where he had also fought in 1914) at 09.30, just 90 minutes before the ceasefire. This year is the hundredth anniversary and is being commemorated across the U.K. with numerous special events.



In 1919, a South African Sir Percy Fitzpatrick, proposed a two-minute silence.

Within weeks of the proposal it had spread throughout the British Commonwealth. People observe a one minute or more commonly a two-minute moment of silence at 11:00 am local time on 11th November. It is a sign of respect for, in the first minute, the 20 million people who died in World War I. The second minute is dedicated to the living left behind, commonly thought to be wives, children and families left behind but deeply affected by the conflict.

Armistice Day is not celebrated in Germany, but a German national day of mourning Volkstrauertag has, since 1952, been observed on the Sunday closest to 16th November.

Armistice day became known as Remembrance Day after World War II. The day is also observed by other commonwealth countries and numerous other Nations throughout the world. In Britain, beginning in 1939, the two-minute silence was moved to the Sunday nearest to 11th November in order not to interfere with wartime production should 11th November fall on a weekday. On the second Sunday in November, Remembrance Sunday, special services are held and poppy wreaths laid at the Cenotaph in London and at war memorials in towns and villages all over the country.



During World War I, some of the most intense fighting took place in Flanders (west Belgium). Buildings, roads, fields and woods were destroyed. However, despite the devastation, poppies flowered each spring. Poppy seeds that had been buried for years were brought to the surface by the churned up mud and germinated. The poppy is used to symbolize remembrance and in the United Kingdom the Royal British Legion sell poppies in the weeks prior to 11th November to raise money for servicemen and their families.

PARISH FEATURE

Remembrance Day, or Poppy Day as it became known, adopted the emblem from the poem, In Flanders Fields.

John McCrae, a Canadian fighting in the trenches in Flanders, in 1915 wrote the poem called 'In Flanders Fields'. The poem was published and the poppy was adopted as a symbol for all those who had lost their lives in conflict.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders fields.
Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep,
though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

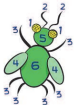

Remembering Enid Blyton

Enid Blyton, one of the most successful children's writers of the 20th century, died 50 years ago this month, on 28th November 1968. She wrote more than 760 books.

She was born in 1897 and as a baby nearly died of whooping cough. Although best known for her *Noddy* books and the *Famous Five* series, she also wrote poetry and longer stories and articles of various kinds.

A trained teacher, she also wrote *The Children's Life of Christ* and *The Land of Far-Beyond*, an adaptation for children of John Bunyan's *The Pilgrim's Progress*.

For Britain, the First World War began on 4th August 1914 and ended on 11th November 1918. At the start, the British Government asked for 100,000 volunteers to join the Army. 750,000 applied in the very first month. An estimated 250,000 British boys lied about their age in order to join up. The youngest caught was just 12 - he was sent home. Average life expectancy in the trenches was just six weeks. In all, 65 million men from 30 countries fought in the First World War. More than nine million fighting men were killed during the conflict, a third of them through disease. At least 750,000 of these were British. The Victoria Cross, the highest military award, was awarded 628 times in the First World War.
