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Dear Friends.

There is a story of a returning champion who enters a city with celebration and elation. The crowds in need of some positive outlet lift him up on a pedestal and chant as he passes by. However within a few days our champion himself has in anger turned on the authorities reacting against their injustice and manipulation. He is perceived as a threat to power and, acknowledging his likely future, he withdraws to reflect with and say goodbye to his friends and family. It is in one of these moments of quiet reflection that he is finally betrayed by one of his own. Our champion is beaten and receives the harshest of punishments from the authorities as they take his life.

That is of course the journey of Jesus to his death on a cross that we remember at Easter. It is a journey that reflects his whole roller coaster of a life; a life with ups and downs and a life where he frequently withdraws to reflect and find peace. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to see that there is something we, who have had a roller coaster of a year, can learn from this life. I am not by nature the type of person that finds solace in withdrawing to reflect. Show me what is broken and I will fix it, my normal approach, but there are some things you and I cannot fix.

You and I cannot fix the pain you may have over losing someone to death over the last year. Neither can we immediately fix the frustration of lockdown and impact that has had on our mental wellbeing, finances or any number of other situations in our lives. However there is some solace to be found if we follow the example of the champion and just for a moment take some time to reflect.

The 23rd March was a special day of reflection but it is not one that needs to stand alone. St Thomas' on Bidbury Lane is open for just that type of reflection 9am - 4pm every weekday. Indeed if you read this in time we will have a special opportunity to specially reflect this Easter. Our Easter Journey of the Champion Jesus around the outside of St Thomas' is one of those opportunities.

An opportunity to bring a ribbon or prayer symbolising your pain from the last year, to walk the Easter story and at the end of the journey to tie the symbol to the cross as you



sit and reflect. An opportunity to reflect that the darkest moment of death for our champion was not the end, and that the hope and light of an Easter is just around the corner.

Parish Administrator



Bishop's Farewell Service


On April 24th at 4pm there will be a service in Portsmouth Cathedral to celebrate and give thanks for Bishop Christopher's leadership in the diocese since 2010. This is a special and important service in the life of the diocese, but it takes place when we will continue to live under some restrictions due to Covid 19. It will be live-streamed to enable as many people from across our diocese to be part of the service.

It is sad that the number of those able to be physically present in the cathedral will be limited, and as such it will by invitation only. It is the wish of Bishop Christopher that the invites will be issued to as diverse a group as possible, so the different aspects of diocesan life will be represented by those present.

Bishop Peter to retire

Many of you will remember Bishop Peter Hancock from his time as vicar of St Wilfrid's Church, Cowplain (1987-99), and as Archdeacon of the Meon (1999-2010). He also visited Bedhampton on numerous occasions to lead some our services.

Many of you have also been praying for him after he was diagnosed as living with leukaemia. Sadly, he has now announced



that he is to retire early as Bishop of Bath and Wells on medical grounds.

Bishop Peter has been receiving treatment for leukaemia since last August. In a letter to the diocese today he wrote that while he had been hoping to return to work before long, his hospital consultant has said he will need to spend many months recovering and will initially be unable to lead services in public, use public transport or go into indoor public spaces.

National Day of Reflection

The Church of England is joining Marie Curie, Hope UK, Care for the Family, Ataloss and many other organisations on March 23rd to mark exactly a year since lockdown started with a National Day of Reflection. The idea is to:

- 1 Take a minute to reflect (pausing for a moment at 12noon that day);
- 2 Take a moment to connect (with those who have been bereaved)

The idea is that we don't just remember those who have died of Covid, but also those who have died of other causes, but had restricted numbers at funerals; those who have been ill or separated from family members; and so on. You might send a simple prayer card to a grieving family, or bless your local care home with kindness.

Whilst the day this year has already passed by the time you read this, the idea is always something to reflect on at prayer time. – Ed.

100 years of the PCC

It is one hundred years since parish churches gained the power to run their own affairs, separately from what we now regard as local government.

The religious affairs of a parish, as well as its secular business had been controlled by a single committee, which met in the church and was known as the 'Vestry'. Then, in 1894, Parish Councils were formed to deal with secular matters; the Vestry continued to oversee church affairs until 1921, when Parochial Church Councils (PCC) were established. People still get confused by the two.

Churchwardens have been around since the 13th Century and legally 'own' the movable contents of the church. They are meant to maintain order in the church and churchyard, with the assistance of their staves, if necessary. In the event of serious disorder today, a mobile phone might be a safer instrument, with staves reserved for ceremonial occasions! Churchwardens are now chosen by parishioners, though the Incumbent (i.e. Vicar or Rector) has a limited right of veto.

Today, anyone on the Electoral Roll of the church (this is another confusion, for the secular Electoral Roll is entirely separate) can attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which elects the PCC. The Incumbent is an *ex officio* member, as are other licensed clergy and Churchwardens, members of the Deanery Synod, plus any member of the Diocesan Synod and General Synod who lives in the parish or is on the Roll. The Incumbent chairs the PCC, which elects a Vice-Chair and appoints a Standing Committee to transact business between meetings.


The purpose of a PCC, which must meet at least four times a year, is to consult together with the Incumbent "on matters of general concern and importance to the parish", and that includes the "whole mission of the Church". Did you know that changes to the forms of service, or the vesture or the minister, can only happen after consultation?

Inevitably, money and building maintenance take up a lot of room on the Agenda, though we all know they are less important than mission. It is a real challenge for every PCC member to pray for non-churchgoing parishioners and to find imaginative ways of introducing them to Christ and His Church.

If you've got this far and are a member of your PCC - congratulations - you are one hundred years old this year!

Here in Bedhampton, the **Annual Meeting (APCM) 2021** will take place on **Sunday 25th April** at **St. Nicholas Church** at **11 o'clock** following a joint service at 10am. Please follow instructions to book your attendance. *See page 20*.

In 2020 the usual APCM meeting was postponed until last Autumn due to the Covid-19 virus and closure of churches.

Charles Wesley's great hymn for Easter: Christ the Lord is risen today!

Jesus's death on the cross, and His resurrection on Easter morning are both part of the redemption story. Paul links them in this way: 'He was delivered for our offences [the Cross] and raised again [the Resurrection] for our justification' (Romans 4:25). Charles Wesley does likewise in his glorious Easter anthem.

Christ the Lord is risen today!
Sons of men and angels say.
Raise your songs and triumph high
Sing, ye heavens, thou earth reply.

Charles wrote the hymn in 1739, a year after his Pentecost Sunday evangelical conversion, and the year in which he began his open-air preaching. Like all his hymns that followed in the next four decades, this hymn is full of New Testament references and allusions. A great stone was rolled into the opening of the grave where Jesus was laid, and as Matthew records, the Jewish authorities 'made the tomb secure, sealing the stone and setting a guard' (27:66). But all to no purpose! Christ, the Lord of Life, could not be imprisoned by death!

Vain the stone, the watch, the seal Christ hath burst the gates of hell. Death in vain forbids Him rise Christ hath opened Paradise!

The NT teaches that Christ's resurrection was the Father's seal of approval on His obedient life and atoning death. His resurrection was the proof that He was indeed Jesus Christ the Lord, as Paul argues in Romans 1:4. 'Declared to be the Son of God ...by the resurrection from the dead.' Charles Wesley works these great salvation truths into his verses. 'Love's redeeming work is done.' 'Once He died our souls to save.' 'Lives again our glorious King.' 'Where, O death, is now thy sting?' As our Lord promised His disciples long ago – and still promises us; 'Because I live, you will also live' (John 14:19).

The Resurrection of Christ, viewed as a historical fact, is only part of the NT teaching. His conquest of death He now shares with all His people. Christians are the people of the Resurrection! We are now 'made alive with Christ;' 'raised up with Him,' and already seated 'in heavenly places' (Ephesians 1:4-6). Charles Wesley takes up this great theme of how believers share in their Lord's resurrection power.

Soar we now where Christ hath led Following our exalted Head. Made like Him, like Him we rise Ours the cross, the grave, the skies.

Still we seek the things above . . .

Christ has conquered hell! Death has lost its sting! The grave is spoiled! What a Saviour! What a gospel! What a glorious hope! Rev Dr. Herbert McGonigle, Parish Pump.

EASTER CELEBRATIONS

Although we are not going to be able to meet physically again this year, there will be a Good Friday service, an Easter Day celebration, together with an Easter Garden, both at St Thomas and at St Nicholas.

EASTER BISCUITS

Last year Messy Church included the making (and eating!) of Easter biscuits.

This recipe is taken from BBC/ Mary Berry on-line.

Ingredients

100g/3½oz unsalted butter, softened 75g/2¾oz caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling 1 free-range egg yolk

1 small unwaxed lemon, finely grated zest only 200g/7oz plain flour

1 level tsp each mixed spice & cinnamon

1-2 tbsp milk

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven 180C/160C Fan/Gas 6. Line baking trays with baking paper.
- 2. Beat sugar and butter together until light and fluffy. Beat in egg yolk, stir in flour and spices, mix well and add enough milk to make a fairly soft dough.
- 3. Halve the mixture. For traditional currant biscuits, add 1oz currants to one half and lightly knead the dough on a floured surface and roll out to 5mm/ ¼inch thick. Using a fluted cutter, make rounds and place on baking tray. Sprinkle with castor sugar.
- 4. Bake for 10-15 minutes or until lightly golden.
- 5. For iced biscuits, knead remaining dough and roll out to 5mm/ ¼inch thick. Cut into Easter shapes with cutters, e.g. bunnies, Easter eggs, chicks. Bake for 10-15 minutes. Leave to cool.
- Decorate with coloured icing as desired.

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APRIL 23rd - ST GEORGE'S DAY

The Saint of an English Army before he was Patron Saint of England, St George may have been a soldier, but he was no Englishman. Some stories say that he was an officer in the Roman army under Diocletian, who refused to abandon his faith during the Terror, and was martyred at Lydda in Palestine. Over the years, St. George became the example of a Christian fighting-man, a powerful helper



against evil powers affecting individual lives. He was the soldier-hero of the Middle Ages, of whom remarkable deeds were reported.

We celebrate St George, famous for slaying a dragon, a tradition which became popular in the Middle Ages. Whether he killed an actual dragon is open to question! However, as a Roman soldier at the time of Emperor Diocletian, he refused to renounce his faith, as commanded by the Emperor, resulting in his death on 23rd April, 303 AD.

Today, we are still called to stand for Christ against wrongs and injustice in daily life, whatever the personal cost. However, we also need to be ready to look our enemies in the eye and meet their hostility with love and compassion. This is why we also remember that Jesus died and rose again, so that we might have God's power to do this in our lives.

Services from SEPTEMBER 2020 onwards

BOTH CHURCHES ARE STILL CLOSED AT PRESENT

A new pattern of services started in September, with one service in each church on each Sunday. However, only one service will be streamed on-line and will be available every Sunday at 10am for the time being.

Sunday one - Online - 8am Sunday Worship Online.
