Dear Friends

There is a moment in the Communion service where we declare our faith during which we state that we believe in, "the holy catholic Church". If we notice it at all before we rush on to the Amen, then it may be that we briefly wonder why the Church of England is referencing the Roman Catholic Church in our services. It is not, but instead the word catholic is used to mean the whole of God's church. Perhaps Cyril put it best.

"It is called Catholic then because it extends over all the world, from one end of the earth to the other; and because it teaches universally and completely one ... and because it brings into subjection to godliness the whole race of mankind."

By the way Cyril was one of those very old thinkers from the fourth century, but to be fair he summed it up perfectly for us today. Indeed reading his words this side of recent sporting events and the backlash of racism experienced by some of the sportsmen brought tears to my eyes. How is it possible that we can look at one another and judge a person's humanity on anything, let alone the colour of their skin? How can we exclude one another like this?

I need to be real, the human led church is not without sin in this area; and all the time that we do not reflect the welcoming Kingdom of God, our worship is simply chaff in the wind. Another ancient writer reminded us that the only worship our Lord requires is, "to act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Jesus, himself a person of colour, from the wrong part of town, built his catholic church to be open to the whole of our world. His church needs to not only welcome people of all colours, all sexualities, all walks of life, people we agree with and disagree with; but we need to also make sure that they experience love, mercy and justice in our society.

This means we need to call out the lack of love and mercy and highlight injustice when we see it. This is where it gets messy because we are different and we may disagree on what it means to love, and seek justice and mercy for one another.

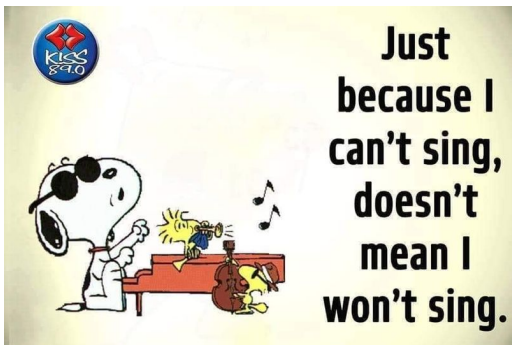

'On Holiday with Jesus'

August is the month when schools are off and many of us go on holiday. This year will be very different, with many opting for a 'staycation'! The good news is that Jesus offers us a true rest:



'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.' (Matthew 11: 28-29). Are you feeling tired or burdened and in need of a holiday? Jesus invites you to spend it with Him!

The Invitation: Our holiday destination is Jesus Himself: 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened.' We can come just as we are, with all the burdens and sadness we carry from the last 18 months. Jesus doesn't offer a 'quick fix' to deal with our issues; He simply offers Himself!

The Promise: Jesus promises us the gift of refreshing, sustaining and everlasting rest. When we go on holiday, we usually look forward to doing very little and yet this is not the kind of rest Jesus offers. His rest involves taking up His yoke and learning from Him! A yoke was the wooden collar that ran across the shoulders of a pair of oxen to enable them to work the fields. Jesus says: 'My yokes fit well. They do not rub your neck and shoulders. Come to Me and get yoked to Me. Make an act of loyal obedience and trust in Me. And you will find a deep peace and satisfaction that you could never find anywhere else. I have come for you!'

What's so amazing about this holiday is that you can get rest by simply staying at home!

News from Sam & Chloe

To our wonderful friends!

We are so sorry for the lack of updates and communication. Life seems to be flying by, we can't believe we have been back for 6 months already! We feel so much more settled and happier than ever before. It just feels so much like this is where God wants us to be. Sam's project has seen so much favour, with most of his goals for the year being nearly completed in the first 6 months. God has been so kind to us, connecting us with people at just the right time and giving us the strength to manage really tough situations.

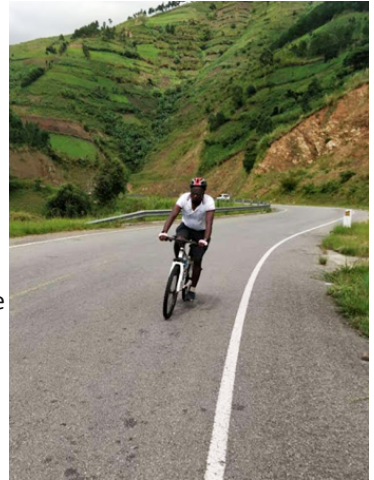


We have alluded to it before, but we feel like it is time to share with you some of our conclusions which have come from our organisational challenges. After 10 years of working alongside Joy for Children Uganda as an implementing partner in Kampala, our working relationship has come to an end. We are trying to iron out all the finer details, but it is taking some time. We are in the process of looking for another NGO to partner with; most likely a couple, one for Sam's work and another for Chloe's. Hopefully our missional community focus and space at home will work as a middle ground for our ministry together as a family.

We know many of you support the work of Joy for Children and Communities and we want to assure you that we still have the money in the UK account and are hoping to continue the projects (with some tweaks!) in the future once a new implementing partner has been finalised. Children who are on sponsorship have still received school fees through Chloe & Sam sending mobile money to parents and picking up receipts. However, unfortunately, we are now in lockdown here in Uganda which means they have closed Schools and Churches among other things. We are encouraged to work from home and no cars (unless with a special pass) are allowed on the road and public transport has been stopped. We aren't quite sure what work looks like for us in this season yet but we know it will be quieter and so we are hoping to take the opportunity for some time out as a family and focus on some personal development.

During the last months it has been very stressful navigating organisational issues and knowing what we can and can't do. Thankfully, Chloe has been able to continue relationships with many friends in the community and continues to visit people throughout the week. It has been precious continuing to build new friendships and doing life with so many. However, the pressure of realising I was the only one visiting people became hard. So, it really has been wonderful building up small teams of women in the community to check on people and pray and encourage one another. Please do pray we can find more wonderful people to work alongside.

Sam's work has been going really well with new opportunities just opening up every week! Sam has been training some national riders for the past few months. It's been great having the cycle centre next door and having the space to host people. The riders have just gone to race in a big event in Kenya and the compound feels very quiet! Rafa has been an excellent support to Sam and has been able to start training a few younger boys as Sam focuses on bigger picture things. Recently Sam has signed a Memorandum of Understanding for some land (over 100 acres!!) to be leased for 10 years - which is INCREDIBLE. The land is just an hour out of Kampala and the dream is to set up a Cycle race track which would be awesome. This really is just a HUGE answer to prayer. Sam has been dreaming about a Cycle Centre for years now and really believed it was from God but didn't know what it looked like. Then looking at the way God gifted this land to Sam is just incredible. So God continues to be so faithful to us, even in the heartache of parting ways with Joy for Children Uganda.



We keep reflecting on whether, in 2019, if we had faced everything we had this year, would we still be here. The honest answer is probably not. It makes us so thankful to God for our time of personal development when in lockdown in the UK and really reminds us that God knows best! We continue to enjoy parenting and Zara-Grace brings us so much joy. She is 8 and a half months and already walking around the house whilst balancing on sofas! She definitely is an adventurer!

We plan to head back to visit Churches in September/October time (if we are not on the red list!) and would love to see as many of you as possible! So, do let us know if you'd like us to come along to your Church, home group or just catch up!!

WILDLIFE DURING LOCKDOWN

Following the article by Pete Spencer in the June issue about paying more attention to nature, prompted me to write something of our experience.

Whilst the airline industry has been severely affected by the Covid pandemic, the difference it has made in our area has been extremely noticeable, together with very little noise from road traffic during lockdown. Above us is the West/East route of aircraft returning from elsewhere, together with the return route South/North from the continent. Whilst most aircraft are flying at about 20,000 feet, at peak times, they appear at 1 minute intervals. It can be quite fun watching them and looking at the computer programme where you can discover their start airports, destinations and their exact height, but the noise does seem to affect wildlife.

Without all of this noise, during this last year, we have been much more aware of our birdsong. We are fortunate enough to have a large garden with a number of trees, which are frequented by a variety of birds. A large flock of sparrows seems to prefer our shrubs at each side of the garden. Having fed on the seed provided, they sit in the shrubs and chirrup away, whilst blue tits and two resident robins feed and sing regularly. The resident Great Tit who sings in a tree at the bottom of the garden also visits the bird feeder. It is also wonderful to hear a resident wren sit on the fence and sing non stop, although we have not seen it on the bird feeder.



In the quiet of this spring, we have also watched with pleasure a small group of starlings, eager to get their fill of suet pellets. As the young ones have appeared, the adult birds would collect pellets and feed the babies. As they have grown, they have become noisier and are beginning to fight for their own access to the food! By now most have 'flown the nest' to pastures new. The resident pigeons mop up the seed and other food dropped by the smaller birds. There is also a blackbird that visits every day and has become quite tame. He hops under the same shrub, presumably to find food. Resident robins often hop around getting excited if we dig or tidy the garden too.

A Great Spotted Woodpecker is also a regular visitor, but only when no-one is around!

Last summer, we were enjoying looking out at the garden one day, when we suddenly saw a large bird near a flower bed. I took some photos with a long lens and, on looking more closely, we realised that the bird was a sparrowhawk. It had caught a pigeon and was enjoying its meal. At least it wasn't one of our smaller birds.

Watching nature can be fascinating.

DO YOU KNOW WHERE TO FIND A DEFIBRILLATOR?

In an emergency do you know where the nearest defibrillator is situated in Bedhampton? You may be able to save a life ... read on ...

A defibrillator is a device that gives high energy electric shocks to the heart of someone who is in cardiac arrest. This high energy shock is an essential part in trying to save the life of someone who is in cardiac arrest.

This is what to do :

1. Call 999
2. Start CPR
3. Ask someone to bring a defibrillator if there is one nearby.
4. Turn on the defibrillator and you will receive full instruction.

It is pretty well fool-proof; anyone can use one – the machine can detect a heart beat and not shock a person who is not in arrest, so no harm would be done.



So, your first step : make sure you know where the nearest one is situated – we hope you will never need to use it, but safety first! There is one outside the Bedhampton Community Centre *Picture left*.

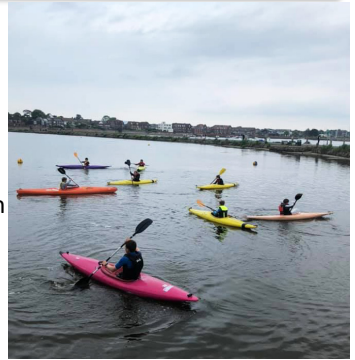
YOUTH ACTIVITIES

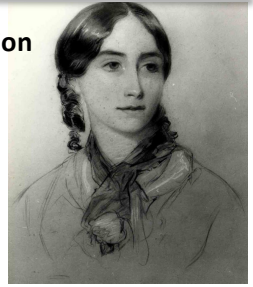

9th August: Mary Sumner – founder of the Mothers' Union

The Mothers' Union is now nearly 145 years old. It has accomplished a staggering amount in that time, and nowadays numbers more than four million members, doing good work in 83 countries. That is a far cry from the modest circle of prayer for mothers who cared about family life, which is how it all began with a rector's wife, Mary Sumner.



Mary was born in late 1828 in Swinton, near Manchester. When she was four, her family moved to Herefordshire. Mary's father, Thomas Heywood, was a banker and historian. Her mother has been described as a woman of "faith, charm and sympathy" – qualities which Mary certainly inherited. Mrs Heywood also held informal 'mothers' meetings' at her home, to encourage local women. Those meetings may well have inspired Mary's later work.

Mary was educated at home, spoke three foreign languages, and sang well. While in her late teens, on a visit to Rome she met George Sumner, a son of the Bishop of Winchester. It was a well-connected family: George's uncle became Archbishop of Canterbury, and his second cousin was William Wilberforce. Mary and George married in July 1848, soon after his ordination. They moved to Old Alresford in 1851 and had three children: Margaret, Louise and George. Mary dedicated herself to raising her children and supporting her husband's ministry by providing music and Bible classes.

When in 1876 Mary's eldest daughter Margaret, gave birth, Mary was reminded how difficult she had found the burden of motherhood. Soon she decided to hold a meeting to which she invited the local women not only of her own class, but also all the village mothers. Her aim was to find out if women could be brought together to offer each other prayer and mutual support in their roles as wives and mothers. That meeting at Old Alresford Rectory was the inaugural meeting of the Mothers' Union.

For 11 years, the Mothers' Union was limited to Old Alresford. Then in 1885 the Bishop of Newcastle invited Mary to address the women churchgoers of the Portsmouth Church Congress, some 20 miles away. Mary gave a passionate speech about the poor state of national morality, and the vital need for women to use their vocation as mothers to change the nation for the better. A number of the women present went back to their parishes to found mothers' meetings on Sumner's pattern. Soon, the Mothers' Union spread to the dioceses of Ely, Exeter, Hereford, Lichfield and Newcastle.

By 1892, there were already 60,000 members in 28 dioceses, and by 1900 there were 169,000 members. By the time Mary died in 1921, she had seen MU cross the seas and become an international organisation of prayer and good purpose.



The Mothers' Union hopes to be able to hold their Annual Service, which I feel I should call a Thanksgiving service, having brought us through a terrible year, that is if our Prime Minister still feels it fit to complete his 'road map' in July. Therefore, our service has been rescheduled at St. Thomas' Bedhampton on the Tuesday 3rd August at 2.00 p.m., which was already planned in our programme, followed by afternoon tea in the Rectory garden, weather permitting!

Providing there are no hiccups that the Prime Minister deems is necessary to take any more actions we will resume with the rest of our 2021 programme in September.

Take care, stay safe and hope we will all be able to meet up in June!
