

St Nicholas Church Messy Sunday News!





I am so pleased to be able to tell you that our first post-lockdown Messy Sunday session took place on 3rd October. The prayers of many were answered and the hard work of an amazing team meant that we were able to welcome many people including thirty-eight children with their families to join us for fun, making, learning, praising God and food!

Our theme was Harvest. We celebrated and thanked God for all the good things that He gives us. The Parable of the Sower (Mark 4: 1-20) was our special story to follow. The farmer sowed seeds that fell on hard, rocky, thorny and good soil which represents our response to hearing the Christian message as taught by Jesus. We all learnt that by praying, reading the Bible and meeting and worshipping with others our Christian faith will grow – just like the seed planted in the good soil.

There were several activities to help us understand the message of the session including making a pumpkin, popcorn and edible dirt! Fruit and veg activities included making them out of play dough – very precise and neat – and printing with them and paint – very messy! Praying and planting seeds, junk modelling tractors/vehicles and colouring and games were also included. Small children enjoyed 'pouring' seeds like water. Then we 'watched' the story, sang songs and prayed before having delicious bacon rolls and cakes. I can't believe we managed to fit all that into an hour and a half!

If you feel like you missed out in October then do join us for our next Messy Sunday 7th November when our theme will be Remembrance. I think we would find it tricky to get silence on that day! Our parish Remembrance Day service will be at St Thomas' Church on 14th November at 10am where you'd be most welcome.


BISHOP ANNOUNCED

ARMISTICE DAY

One hundred years ago, on 11th November 1919, the first Armistice Day (now Remembrance Day) was marked in the UK, after King George V issued a proclamation calling for a two-minute silence at 11:00am on 11th November. The event remembers the members of the armed forces who lost their lives in the line of duty.

It was 100 years ago on 11th November 1921 that poppies for Remembrance were first sold.

The two-minute silence was adopted from a South African idea that had spread from Cape Town through the Commonwealth in 1919.

The Cenotaph was erected temporarily in Whitehall in 1920. In 1939, the two-minute silence of Armistice Day was moved to the nearest Sunday to 11th November, so that it would not conflict with wartime production, a tradition which continues today with services nationwide.

A service of Remembrance will be held at St Thomas' Church on Sunday 14th November at 10.50am.

As Pat did not have one, instead she appeared in a decorated hat and dark glasses. She was also a regular attendee at Mothers' Union events, especially at the outings to meals out together.

Life changed when the pandemic situation meant staying at home and she became unwell. However she did celebrate her 90th birthday earlier this year. She will be sadly missed by her many friends here in Bedhampton.

REMEMBERING PAM FACER By Rev. Sylvia Roberts

I can tell you now that I don't have long enough to say all the things about Pam that I would like to say. I can hear her so familiar voice saying, "Oh! Please don't make a fuss!! It's just a day like any other day."

I've become aware of what a number of contrasts there were in her. Born and brought up as she was in a fairly urban setting and yet loving and yearning for the countryside with its flowers and trees and —



most especially - its birds which as you will all know was one of her lifetime passions and interests. I think Pam spent more on keeping her bird table replenished than anyone I know. I've learned that when Pam was a child, the area where she lived at Paulsgrove was very close to woods and fields where she and her brothers and sister were free to roam so no doubt her love of all things rural stemmed from then.

Pam wasn't able to stay on at school for further education and I know she grieved over that but – my word! – she was a life long learner and loved to ferret out new facts on the internet about any subject that was interesting her at that moment. She also took trouble to learn new skills. We all know that her housekeeping was second to none – she was a great cook and her laundry was her pride and joy but she also loved her crafts and taught herself flower arranging, lace-making, stamping and parchment work. Also..... we all know how important her garden was to her and she took trouble to learn about all her plants and the ways to get the best out of flowers and vegetables. Don't forget, too, that she also learned to drive and mastered computer skills as well as any of her generation and was always glad of continuing help and support to take her even further. And who can forget the wonderful meals she produced during ten years of Luncheon Clubs at Crookhorn and the excellent Christmas meals here at Bedhampton always ably assisted by Mick. For many years she spent 2 evenings a week of help and catering assistance at the Diocesan Retreat House at Catherington and I do know she is warmly remembered for it.

Essentially a self-effacing person with little regard of her own true abilities, Pam would always poohpooh or turn away any praise, yet she was brave enough to push herself against her own nature at times. I understand that when she was in primary school she had a part in a school play but at the last minute was so terrified that her sister had to take her place. And can you believe that in her youth she began to learn fencing and became quite adept at the nimble footwork.



She disliked being "up-front" and yet she was a thoughtful and prayerful leader of the Intercessions in church for many years, agonizing over her preparation. When we studied a Book together over the phone last Lent, we had a very lively discussion about the concept of ego. Pam insisted....and would not be budged.....that ego meant "bigging yourself up" something that she completely deplored.

Pam would always say that she was very strictly brought up and family has always been of the greatest importance to her. After she and Mick married at St. John Purbrook, she remained very close to her mum and her brother Neil – (she could never forget how she enjoyed wheeling him out in his pram when he was a baby.) In their new home in Crookhorn after they were married it was a case of "New house – New baby" as soon Michele and Paul arrived to make a new little family. In fact she nearly always called her children "My-Michele" or "My-Paul" as if that was their full name. In recent years she has renewed a warm relationship with her sister Diane and they have been able to share a lot together. It also pleased her when Andy and Helen joined the wider family. She and Mick have enjoyed a good long marriage and some of us here were able to enjoy celebrating their Golden Wedding with them some years ago.

Pam was constantly interested in the neighbourhood children and the little ones at church delighted her – but woe betide them – or any of us indeed - if we got her "Paddington Bear Hard Stare." That was capable of stopping a runaway horse in its tracks!!

In recent years Pam has become very environmentally aware carefully reviewing each area of her life - from shopping, through responsible giving to recycling and setting us all a good example in the ways she literally "put her money where her mouth was."

Pam loved clothes but she hated shopping and was without doubt the most indecisive shopper I ever shopped with. She could easily spend half an hour deciding whether to buy the red or the blue... or perhaps to try another shop!

She loved looking at the stars in the night sky and it made her very conscious of the preciousness of our little planet. Pam's Christian faith has underpinned her thoughts and her actions for the whole of her life. She was a committed Christian, a worshipping Christian and most of all a Christian who truly lived her faith following the teachings of



Jesus. Her faith was deeply nurtured when "Crookhorn Community Church" began, as

Bishop Peter Price remembered. He was the priest at the church at that time.

Pam became fully involved here in Bedhampton, as a churchwarden, a flower arranger, with Messy Church and many other activities. We will miss her smile and cheerful personality. Perhaps she may also be remembered for her responsibilities for church candles, church linen, and not forgetting the toilet rolls!

SEAT UNVEILED

Around 40 people gathered at Bidbury Mead to witness the unveiling of an inscribed oak bench commemorating the visit, in 1819, of romantic poet John Keats to Bedhampton. Fortunately, the threatened rain kept away, and, as the breeze grew stronger, the temporary shelters could be taken down.

The bench is in the northeast corner of the Mead near the entrance from Kingscroft

Lane where Keats would have arrived on his walk from Chichester. The vista from here includes views of the gables at Mill House and The Manor House that would be familiar to Keats.

On behalf of Bidbury Mead Friends, Mike Sellis provided a welcome to all and thanked the many contributors to the project. He introduced Nigel Gossop who explained the significance of the commemoration of this piece of local historic heritage. He then invited Councillor Alex Rennie, Leader of Havant Borough Council, to unveil the bench on behalf of the community. Following pictures and interviews, welcome light refreshments were provided in the Parish Room. The Friends are planning to provide a further information board nearby which will contain a section about Keats.

Nigel Gossop, a member of the Bedhampton Historical Collection, said: "John Keats was the last of the Romantic poets to be born and sadly, the first to die. He was a key figure in the second generation of the Romantic poets."

Bidbury Mead Friends have been raising funds to create an inscribed seating area which commemorates English poet John Keats, who wrote his famous work The Eve of St Agnes while staying at Bedhampton in January 1819.

Keats returned in September 1820 when the ship he was travelling on was forced by a storm to dock in Portsmouth for repairs and take on supplies.

Travelling to Italy in the belief the warmer weather would improve his tuberculosis, Keats' stay would be his last night on English soil as he died in Rome on February 23rd, 1821 at the age of 25.

Mike Sellis, Secretary and Treasurer for the Friends Steering Group, which was set up in 2008 as a not-for-profit environmental body to attract funding for works to protect and enhance the park, made a welcome speech:

'In a few minutes I will invite Nigel Gossop, a familiar face to many in Bedhampton, who is largely responsible for raising the profile of John Keats and his links with Bedhampton. Nigel organised a range of events in 2019 to mark the bicentenary of Keats' visits. The funds raised at those events have been applied by the Friends to provide a lasting commemoration here.

The Friends have had a few successful collaborations with Havant Mens' Shed; picnic tables at the playground and seating around the Jubilee Tree. Again, we thank them and particularly Mike Skelton who project managed the bench and is here with their Chairman, Steve Sadler, and other members. The Friends have their own project manager, Ron Tate, whose local government experience has helped the process to reach fruition.

The openness of Bidbury Mead is testimony to the historic setting of Bedhampton. This Kingscroft Lane entrance would have been Keats' point of arrival on his walk from Chichester. The bench will provide a physical commemoration of his visit. The vista from it contains features in the panorama that he would still recognise today. We are here to commemorate Keats and I invite you to bring to life his contribution to our heritage here.

The Friends believe the bench will enhance Bidbury Mead. It forms a gift to Havant.



The seat is positioned under and between two mature trees in a calm and peaceful spot. It includes an engraving of Keats' portrait and words taken from his poem. The Eve of St Agnes. A lasting legacy to Keats' connection to Bedhampton.

Where have we all been, well the majority of the leaders work in the very front line of Healthcare or Education and have been somewhat preoccupied. Those of us who felt able offered Guiding via Zoom and outdoor meetings. We would like to thank St Thomas' Church for taking away any financial concerns we were harbouring and for welcoming us all back with open arms. One of the nicest comments I had on the first night back in the building was from Scouter Nigel Vosper his "Welcome back, it is good to see you all," quite brought a lump to my throat.

We have 7 units which meet at the Church centre weekly; each individual team manages the Girl Guiding programme whilst keeping to the core values and providing a safe all girl space.

The Rangers who meet on Friday evenings for girls aged 14 + returned with an amazing Tall Ships sailing opportunity, whilst 1st Bedhampton Guides, who also meet on Friday evenings, had an activity day at Fort Purbrook.

The youngest section for girls aged 5+, Rainbows, will be learning about the History of Guiding towards their first badge. Rainbows is good place to start to build foundations in Guiding.

4th Guides who meet on Thursday evenings, are loving getting to know all of their new girls who joined virtually during lockdown, as well as catching up with each other over tea and toast during their first evening indoors. The girls have lots planned for a busy term, including swimming, taekwondo and a weekend's escape under canvas! A first-time experience for most of our girls, the leaders can't wait to share the magic of camp with them!

4th Brownies age 7+ who also meet on Thursday evenings, are looking forward to meeting lots of new friends and learning about the promise and what Brownies is all about. They're also looking forward to gaining their first badge this year!

3rd Guides and 1st Brownies who previously met simultaneously with the adults sharing the care of the activities and evening's proceedings, have adjusted how they now work. The units have both reduced the time in their meetings and now run Brownies from 5.45pm to 7pm and Guides from 7pm to 8.30pm. Both units have welcomed more new members than they had return, so it is an exciting time getting to know each other. The units have chosen a variety of activities. A Festival of Lights parade is planned for mid-November which will culminate in a Promise ceremony outside.

All units are thinking up fun ways to raise money for the Church Toilet fund and we have our thinking caps on.

Wordsearch for November: Poppies

It was 100 years ago this month, on 11th November 1921, that Remembrance poppies were sold for the first time in British and Commonwealth countries to commemorate military personnel who died in war, and to raise funds for members of the Royal British Legion.

Amid the mud, blood and carnage of trench warfare in World War 1, tens of thousands of bright red poppies had grown, marking the graves of the fallen. This led John McCrae, a Canadian army physician who had lost a colleague, to write "In Flanders Fields",

In Flanders fields, the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place, and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly.

This image inspired the adoption of a red poppy as the symbol of all soldiers who had died in conflict. In the UK they are sold by the Royal British Legion to raise funds for current and former members of the British Armed Forces. Around 30 million poppies are sold each year.
