REMEMBERING FRIENDS IN BEDHAMPTON

John Berry was born in 1932 in Portsmouth, and soon afterwards his dad, Charles, was posted to Hong Kong for 3 years, and his education started. The young family had a wonderful time. They returned to England and in 1938 his brother, Peter was born. They soon had to move from Portsmouth to Catisfield for safety during World War 2.

After the war the family returned to Portsmouth and John took an apprenticeship in the dockyard as an electrician. He did well in the Dockyard school and went on to take a degree in electrical engineering at Portsmouth Technical College, as an external London University degree. It was a very proud moment for mum and dad when they attended the degree ceremony in London. He was a good tennis player and together with Peter would spend hours practising on the Southsea courts.

He took up old time dancing where he met Margaret and took part in competitions together, although he was not as good as Margaret. They married in November 1957 and moved to the Midlands where he worked for English Electric.

Unfortunately, during delivery, they lost a baby girl and were then unable to have children. John worked at many places but eventually did electrical sub-contracting work. Following Margaret's early death in 1974 John met Mary Harwood, a family he knew when he was married to Margaret. They married in 1977 and enjoyed many happy holidays together in Italy and Greece. When Mary become ill, he spent many years nursing and caring for her. John always had a very good sense of humour and enjoyed the company of many friends and neighbours in and around Bedhampton and to those further afield by phone.

Edward 'Ted ' Fletcher was born in 1937. He was a happy, caring, loving and thoughtful person, which extended from his family to his friends. He met his childhood sweetheart, Patricia, and married in 1959 at St Thomas Church. They had two children Chris and Lisa. Ted's son Chris said this was where his parents started their married life; it was easy to see how much they loved each other and that love never wavered through all the years spent together; his mother was honoured at St.Thomas' a few years ago and now his father.

Ted loved the countryside and also loved working on tractors and diggers. He also



loved spending time with Lisa at the stables, building, repairing and generally helping out.

He also had a keen interest for vintage vehicles and would love to restore them. During the BMX era, Ted spoke with the neighbour to ask if he could turn the bit of field next door to us, into a BMX track for all to use in the neighbourhood. He went to work with his digger and in no time at all, there was this amazing BMX track with jumps, slopes and burns, it was a lot of fun!!



Alison Bull (née Bettesworth) was born in November 1926 at Poplar Cottage, Horndean to Kenneth and Eileen. Eileen had returned from Canada and Kenneth followed soon after and they lived with her parents at Poplar Cottage until 1932 when they moved to Park Lane, Bedhampton. Alison's brother Michael was born soon afterwards.

Alison attended the local school in Bedhampton followed by Pitmans College in West Street, Havant where she gained her secretarial qualifications. Her first job was in the Dockyard, Portsmouth until her father, who worked for Havant Council, heard that there was a secretarial position vacant. She applied and was offered the job where she remained for the rest of her working life.

If he was not at work, he would be found happily tinkering away in the garage or shed fixing or building something. He even made time to make patio slabs.

The family will miss his smile, energy, spirit and sense of humour.



Alison loved ballroom dancing and looked very glamorous and stylish in her gowns. She and her dancing partner Len took part in competitions, even reaching the local district final held in the main hall at Arundel Castle. Len and Alison married at Fareham Register Office and lived with Len's mother in Brookside Road, Havant. She became step mother to Len's daughter Kay. Alison and Len loved nature and the countryside and joined the Ramblers Association. They also enjoyed several holidays in Austria.

After Len's death in 1998, Alison continued to live at Brookside Road and became a member of the congregation of St Thomas's Church, Bedhampton, until her health gradually deteriorated and she was unable to care for herself. She moved into Emsworth House Care Home in 2016 where she was very well looked after.

Alison has outlived many of her family and friends but we will remember her gentle and caring nature, her ready smile, her tinkly laugh, her interest in others, her untidiness, her spirit and her dogged determination to overcome adversity.

The story behind 'Thine be the glory, risen, conquering Son'

Here is a hymn that is so well known and loved that it has simply burst the bounds of Easter, and gets sung regularly at other times of the year. It has two stories behind it.

First, the music. The rousing music did not start out as a hymn, but instead was written by Handel for his opera 'Judas Maccabeus', first performed in 1746. Originally the words ran 'See the conquering hero comes', for Handel's opera tells the story (found in the Apocrypha) of the leader of the Jews, Judas Maccabeus, who led an army against the Syrians and restored worship at the Temple. With its triumphant refrain after each verse, the music is easy to learn and sing, and can be (and has been!) played to great effect either by the trumpets, on an organ in a large resonant church, or even on guitars (!).

Secondly, the words. They were not written until 1884, 138 years after the music. We owe them to the Revd Raymond Budry, a Swiss pastor from Lausanne. Ordained in the Free Evangelical Church in Vaud, he spent 35 years as the pastor of Vevey on Lake Geneva. Budry wrote the hymn in French ('A Toi La Gloire!') to console himself after the death of his first wife, and a year later (1885) it was published in *Chants Evangeliques*. Soon it found its way into English – translated by a Baptist minister from Kingston-upon-Thames, Richard Hoyle.

It is not clear who first had the idea of teaming *those* words with *that* music, but when they did, the hymn really took off. By 1904 it was being translated into other languages. The theme of 'battle' is never far from this hymn, whether it was the battle of Maccabeus or the battle over sin which was won by Christ on the cross and in rising from the tomb. What would Handel make of it, if he could know that his battle music had become one of the world's most popular and well-known Easter hymns? A devout man, working for the poor, praying twice each day, and attending St Paul's Cathedral, so probably delighted.

Showground

Please be aware that the showground is on grass. It is all fairly level and flat, however the ground quality will depend on the weather preceding and during the show. Electric scooters and wheelchairs shouldn't have any problems, but manual wheelchairs might struggle if ground conditions aren't optimal. The pathways in the Walled Garden, as well as those leading to it, are flat and made of firm gravel.

All the marquees have carpeted or matted flooring, laid over grass.

There are long wooden benches dotted around the showground, as well as multiple seating areas with tables and chairs, some of which are under cover (these will be marked on the showground map as 'Shaded Seating').

Each block of toilets (portaloos) will have a wheelchair accessible unit.


