The world feels a bit like that at the moment; every day a fresh concern - a war in Ukraine, humanitarian decisions concerning migrant folk, reduced numbers of NHS staff, a long wait for an ambulance, increased use of food banks, increased petrol and food prices, Government squabbling - - -

And yet; our dear world holds its place in the Universe. Within our Church family we have been able to welcome at least five new babies this year, and early in July we will welcome our new Curate Jill Kingston.

Last weekend, on a walk across the South Downs from Idsworth Church to Chalton Church, the corn in the fields was beginning to ripen, with the skylarks singing overhead; it put me in mind of the poem In Flanders Fields (i)

" and in the sky, the larks, still bravely singing,

fly scarce heard amid the guns below."

Never wanting to debase the horrors of the First World War; we have no guns, but we are in turmoil here below.

There is no easy answer. In our own " small corner " we can pause and think on the first two Commandments. 'Love the Lord your God,' and 'love your neighbour as yourself.'

How to handle a new Curate. Ten tips

1. **With care!** Put yourself in his or her shoes. Only a few days ago Curates were trying on their dog collars for the first time and probably feeling pretty self-conscious. They will be both excited and daunted at the prospect of putting 'Rev' in front of their names.

2. With respect. The new curate has been trained and set apart by ordination as a minister in the Church of God. If it's the Church of England, the first year will be spent as a Deacon; after that, most will be ordained priest.

3. **With prayer**. This is the secret ingredient. And the most important. From now on, give your curate a regular mention in your prayers. And tell them you're doing so - it will encourage them no end.

4. With humanity. Clergy aren't perfect. It's an old joke but a good one, that if you don't like the clergy you've got, remember there's only the laity to pick from. By the way, clergy spouses and children aren't ordained, so don't expect them to be theologians.

5. With expectation. As the Curate climbs the pulpit steps, pray that God will take over and speak through him or her. This isn't 'Britain's Got Talent', so you are neither a judge nor a member of an audience. You are a disciple, eager to learn and, with God's help, to change.

6. **With generosity**. Find out if they can afford to make ends meet. As well as covering family and household expenses, they should be buying theological books from time to time. These can be really expensive.

7. With understanding. Curates have to continue their studies and that will include participating in diocesan training schemes. If married, they must also spend quality time with their families. They shouldn't be working seven days a week.

8. With honesty. If you want to criticise, make sure it's constructive. Don't try to wound or settle scores - have something positive to say at the same time.

9. With hospitality. Invite them to a meal and while you're at it, invite a nonchurchgoing neighbour as well.

10. With humour. Enough said!

MARTA'S STORY

17-year-old Marta is no stranger to the challenges life can throw at you. Her mother was just a teenager when she had her and, feeling unable to care for her, had abandoned Marta, leaving her with her grandmether who raised Marta as her own. Without either her mother or father around. Marta never received her birth certificate and as a result was excluded from education.

Now a mother of a little girl, Marta was unable to got prenatal support during the first few months of her pregnancy, because are had no birth certificate. It was during her third trimester Marta started attending appointments, thanks to her pastor's wife at church, who encouraged her to seek medical advice for her pregnancy.

During one of these appointments, Marta became aware of the birth registration programme run by Viva, Toybox's partner in EI Salvador. The team explained to Marta they would be able to help her and her child get their official identities and birth certificates and as a result, legit in fouch with her until her daughter was born. TOYBOX exists to see

'A World with no Street Children'.

Special Collection Sunday 24th July 10am

Record levels of inequality, violence, migration, war and natural disasters mean children are forced to live or work on the streets around the world. They escape abusive homes, lack of opportunities or end up on the streets after being displaced or trafficked.

The UN estimates there are hundreds of millions of Street children but exact official figures are virtually non-existent. These children are invisible to the world, living without rights and protection on some of the most dangerous streets in the world. Many different factors lead to children making the decision to leave home for the streets.

Poverty – for some children working on the streets can be their only means to earn an income. Many of these children will also live permanently on the streets.

Violence – some children have been chased from home by violence, natural disaster or the need to earn an income. Others have been sold or trafficked and have ended up on the streets.

Exploitation – children whose home life is full of abuse often take refuge on the streets to escape. However, here they are at risk of being enticed by gangs offering friendship or financial gain.

Whatever the reason for children moving to the streets, all of them are at risk of abuse and exploitation on a daily basis. They are exposed to stigmatisation, physical, sexual and psychological violence. Their future is bleak and their life expectancy is terrifyingly low. Toybox works in 7 countries around the world aiming to protect children from abuse, neglect, violence and exploitation.






1pm – Teddy Bears' Picnic 2pm – Opening by the Mayor of Havant Arena events: Scrufts Dog Show; Circus Skills

If seafarers seem irrelevant to your daily life, think again: 90 per cent of everything you buy in the shops comes to you by sea. Merchant seafarers quite literally keep our global economy afloat. Yet it is a tough life, far from loved ones. Merchant ships are harsh working environments, never mind the threat of piracy or even shipwreck.

To help the seafarers, a worldwide network of port chaplains has sprung up. They offer hospitality and friendship, as well as practical, emotional and spiritual support, providing almost a 'home from home' in hundreds of ports, in more than 50 countries. You might wish to support one of these three well-known societies: The Mission to Seafarers (Anglican), The Apostolate of the Sea (Roman Catholic), and The Sailors' Society (inter-denominational).

Sea Sunday

Over many years the 2nd Sunday of July has been kept as Sea Sunday, with a special focus on prayer for all seafarers. The Mission to Seafarers supports the work of sailors facing difficult waters, piracy, and separation from loved ones for long periods at sea. However, we can also experience storms in our own lives. In Acts 27 we read how Paul was being taken as a prisoner to Rome, when he was caught in a storm off Crete. After 14 days they were shipwrecked on the island of Malta.

Paul had warned the crew that it wasn't a safe time of year to sail: *"I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives."* However, Paul's words were ignored, and the ship sailed into a violent storm. By the third day they *'finally gave up all hope of being saved.'* How do we face up to storms in our lives? Do we worry and panic? God doesn't necessarily prevent storms from taking place, but we can trust His purpose through them.

Paul urged the sailors to *"keep courage, because not one of you will be lost, only the ship will be destroyed."* His confidence rested on an angelic promise: *"Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you."* Only the sovereign God, who created the wind and waves, can promise to save people from a storm. What does this mean for us in our circumstances today?


