FULL IMMERSION BAPTISM

On 3rd September, Sue Butwell was baptised at St Thomas'. Nothing unusual about that you might think, there have been many adults baptised from the font in St Thomas'. Indeed, there have, and I have had the joy of baptising those adults. However, when Sue enquired about baptism, I met with her as I do with all candidates, and we spoke about the possibility of baptism from the font, as well as the possibility of baptism by full immersion. Sue's response was different to previous candidates, "Oh that sounds fun," she said.



In the Bible we hear of all ages being baptised or what we sometimes call a christening. We read of the centurion's household which we believe would have included children being baptised. Then there is the example of Jesus being baptised by immersion as an adult, which is the route Sue chose. Older children and adults also have the opportunity to affirm their baptism in the rite of passage we call confirmation. Confirmation is a wonderful public declaration of those promises made on your behalf if you were

Those present witnessed the Rector and Jill the Curate climb into a newly acquired baptism pool which had been expertly warmed by Alec the Verger so it was not too

baptised as a child.

Sue had just shared that she had been nudged by the Holy Spirit to move forward with this public declaration as part of her journey with God. We asked for God's blessing and then the big moment happened as Sue was baptised by being lowered under the water briefly and being helped up again as a symbol of dying to her old life and being born again into a new life with Jesus. A symbol of the cross was marked on her head and then the church family prayed for her.

Sue's baptism was a wonderful moment in her life, but also in the life of our church as we continue to see God bless us as we move forward with Jesus. We are seeing great engagement and favour within our community since we as a Church declared that Bedhampton community is our priority. 


CHORAL WEEKEND in OXFORD

Leeanne completes Ironman Challenge

Two local women have completed the Ironman Vitoria-Gasteiz to raise money for the charity Stop Domestic Abuse.

Leeanne Barber and Lisa Phipps, both fitness instructors, decided that they wanted to complete a full IRONMAN challenge but they had to postpone this due to Covid.

They continued to undertake intensive training to prepare themselves for the gruelling challenge, which consisted of a 2.4 mile open water swim, a 112-mile bike ride followed by a marathon.



In July of this year, the pair flew to Spain and completed the event in under 12 hours, raising £5,000 for the Havant-based charity.

Leeanne said: 'This was such a tough challenge both physically and mentally. I'm delighted that we have successfully raised vital funds to help Stop Domestic Abuse build a new local, child-centred, holistic refuge.'

Stop Domestic Abuse is a charity that aids people that are or have experienced domestic abuse and offers a range of services to help people. The charity provides a confidential service and aims to help, not just victims, but also perpetrators, the police and family members of those who have been domestically abused.

The chief executive Claire Lambon said: 'It has always been our dream to build our own refuge in Havant, so we can create a high-quality facility where women and children can recover and move on to live lives free from abuse.'



One in four women and one in seven children in Hampshire experience domestic abuse. It's now more important than ever to ensure there are specialist refuges to welcome women and their children who have made the incredibly hard decision to leave their home, friends, extended family, and sometimes their job, to find safety.' The two women have raised a significant amount of money that the charity is hoping to put towards the building of a new dedicated refuge for women and children fleeing domestic abuse. Leeanne added: 'Knowing we are helping women and children affected by domestic abuse has kept us motivated throughout our journey.' From the Portsmouth News

SPORTY PARISHIONERS' CHARITY EVENTS

Annie Spencer is taking part in a Half Marathon in aid of the Felix Project and explains what the charity does.

4.7 million adults in London struggle to afford to eat every day, 2 million children are at risk of missing the next meal. Meanwhile, our food industry generates 3 million tonnes of good, edible surplus food each year. The Felix Project is a London-based food redistribution charity set up in 2016 to tackle both issues.

We rescue good, surplus food from the food industry that cannot be sold and would otherwise go to waste. This is high-quality and nutritious, including a high proportion of fresh fruit and vegetables, baked goods, salads, meat and fish. We collect or receive food from over 539 suppliers, including supermarkets, wholesalers, farms and restaurants.

We then sort and then deliver this food to almost 1000 front-line charities, primary schools and holiday programmes in London. That way, food that would have gone to waste is reaching vulnerable people, homeless, people with mental health or those who simply cannot afford to buy regular, healthy food.

The charity is named after Felix, who died suddenly from Meningitis in 2014. Felix was full of compassion for those without his advantages and, in early 2015, his dad was searching for a way to commemorate him. What stuck in his father's mind was a boys' football tournament, he'd played in. Felix told him he'd been upset to learn that many of the 10-year-old boys on the opposing team hadn't had anything to eat that day.

The Felix Project believes in a vision of London where no-one goes hungry and good food is never wasted. And together, we believe we can win the fight against food waste and hunger in London.

Listening to reports of the queues of people in London to pay their respects to the Queen in Westminster Hall and had to leave bags and belongings, food is having to be discarded. However, the Guides informed us that this food would not be wasted; it was being donated to the Felix Project.

To St Luke, a Gentile, we owe the beautifully written Gospel of Luke, and the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician, a disciple of St Paul, a companion on some of his missionary journeys, and an inspired writer. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ. His gospel contains some of the most moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. His emphasis is on poverty, prayer and purity of heart.

DATES AND ANNIVERSARIES

All in the month of OCTOBER

250 years ago, on 21st October 1772, Samuel Taylor Coleridge was born. He co-founded (with William Wordsworth) the Romantic Movement of poetry. Best known for *The Rime of the Ancient Mariner* and *Kubla Khan*.

200 years ago, on 20th October 1822, the Sunday Times newspaper was first published in the UK.

150 years ago, on 12th October 1872, Ralph Vaughan Williams, British composer, was born. There will be performances of his music this year.

100 years ago, on 18th October 1922, the BBC was officially founded as the British Broadcasting Company (now the British Broadcasting Corporation.)

Also 100 years ago, on 24th October 1922, George Cadbury died. He transformed his father's chocolate and cocoa business into one of the world's most successful companies; he also provided low-cost housing and improved working conditions for his employees.

80 years ago, on 30th October 1942, crew members from the British destroyer HMS Petard retrieved codebooks from the German sub *U-559*, enabling cryptographers at Bletchley Park to decipher the version of the Enigma code used by U-boats.

70 years ago, on 6th October 1952, the world premiere of Agatha Christie's play, *The Mousetrap* opened in Nottingham; then in London on 25th November, and is still running, it is the world's longest-running play with more than 28,000 performances.

65 years ago, on 9th October 1957, the Lovell Telescope began operating at the Jodrell Bank Observatory in Cheshire. Now it is the third largest steerable dish radio telescope. It played an important role in the early days of space launches, being the only radio telescope that could detect the weak signals from rockets, satellites and space probes.

60 years ago, on 15th October 1962, British weather forecasts switched from the Fahrenheit scale to Celsius.

40 years ago, on 11th October 1982, Henry VIII's flagship the *Mary Rose* was raised from the bottom of the Solent, 437 years after it sank.

30 years ago, on 13th October 1992, the British Government announced that 31 of the country's 50 remaining deep coal mines would close by March 1993, putting 31,000 miners out of work. Six mines were closed immediately.

20 years ago on 4th October 2002, an American terrorist, pleaded guilty to trying to blow up a transatlantic flight using explosives hidden in his shoes. Life imprisonment.

10 years ago, on 22nd October 2012, American cyclist Lance Armstrong was banned from competitive cycling for life and stripped of all his titles for using illicit drugs.


