

There are also the Prison Chaplains who mainly visit the male prisoners. How often is it that you hear from a prisoner that they found their faith whilst in prison. We can only hope and pray that when they are released the faith that they found will carry them through life and not to reoffend.

From Surgeons/Consultants right down to the cleaners and porters, they are all caring for their patients in one way or another. From the top to the bottom, they are all involved in the day to day running of the Hospitals. One cannot do without the other.

White Ribbon. Organised by DASH (Domestic Abuse Stops Here), This seems to slip under the radar most of the time. This is one of the Mothers' Union main stays throughout the year. There are trained members and mentors who help parents and children to overcome this devastating situation. The Roberts Centre is an organisation which helps people who are struggling to improve their family's difficult circumstances whether it be from homelessness or family breakdown. Mothers' Union branches support Refuges with various food and toiletries thoughout the year.

THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN: All is well with my soul

At St Thomas, this old hymn is not in our hymn book but we found the words and music and sang it, then learned of its origin.

This incredible story of faith belongs to Horatio Spafford (1828-1888). A devout Christian who had immersed himself in Scripture, many years of his life were joyous. A prominent Chicago lawyer, whose business was thriving, he owned several properties throughout the city. He and his wife had four beautiful daughters and one son. Life was more than good.

But faith, no matter how great, does not spare us from adversity. Things began to change. It began with the tragic loss of their four year old son who died from scarlet fever. Not long thereafter, the Great Chicago Fire destroyed nearly every real estate investment Horatio owned.

A few years later in 1873, Horatio decided to treat his wife and daughters to a muchneeded escape from the turmoil. He sent them on a boat trip to Europe, with plans to join them shortly after wrapping up his business. His friend and evangelist, D.L.Moody, would be preaching in England in the autumn. Just a few days later, he received a dreadful telegram from his wife, "Saved alone..." It bore the excruciating news that family's ship had wrecked and all four of his daughters had perished; 11 year old Anna, 9 year old Margaret Lee, 5 year old Elizabeth, and 2 year old Tanetta.

Horatio was on his way to meet his heartbroken wife, passing over the same sea that had just claimed the lives of his remaining children. It was then that he put his pen to paper and the timeless hymn was born, beginning with the words:

When peace like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, thou hast taught me to say It is well, it is well, with my soul

Though Satan should buffet, though trials should come,
Let this blest assurance control,
That Christ has regarded my helpless estate,
And hath shed His own blood for my soul.

Obviously, the voyage was one of deep suffering and is the clear inspiration of the moving and well-loved hymn. Horatio's faith in God never faltered. His wife, Anna, was naturally devastated but testified that in her grief and despair, she had been conscious of a soft voice speaking to her, "You were saved for a purpose!"

Following this deep tragedy, Anna gave birth to three more children, but she and Horatio were not spared even more sadness. Their only son, Horatio, also died at the age of four. The family settled in Jerusalem where they served the needy, helped the poor, and cared for the sick, and took in homeless children. Their desire was to show those living about them, the love of Jesus. At their deaths, both were laid to rest in Jerusalem.

The music for the hymn, which was written by Philip Bliss, was named after the ship on which Horatio and Anna's daughters had died – Ville du Havre.

NEW LOOK SANCTUARY AT ST NICHOLAS

It all began with a conversation between myself and our Worship Lead, Peter Hall as we stared into what had become a rather tired looking St Nicholas' sanctuary. The sanctuary is the focal point of our worship in our services and the home for our Holy Communion table. The long term refurbishment of St Nicholas will include a complete refresh of the main hall, but that is a few years away, as we continue to raise funds and first refresh the small hall and kitchen. However, surely we could give God's home a lick of paint, couldn't we?

The decoration fell to dynamic duo, Alec Matthews and Roy Payne, who gave up most of their summer to complete this mammoth task. The sanctuary was stripped of all lighting and other fixtures, and scaffolding erected to enable repairs to the walls and main window. Sanding and painting, painting and sanding of the walls and floor took most of the time. This was all fuelled by tea and biscuits provided by Deb in the office. A good sense of humour was also required, particularly as the light of the end of the tunnel came into sight, only to be dimmed when I appeared and announced, "Shall we say one more

coat chaps?"


We also wanted to bring Holy Communion nearer to God's people at St Nicholas', just as we do at St Thomas'. However, a table as long as it was does not allow for that flexibility, so some reshaping was on the cards. My friend Iain Sloane transformed the original communion table, which was halved in size and stripped back to reveal the wonderful wood beneath the dark stain. He created a beautiful large cross using the excess wood from the table, which was installed in the middle of the refreshed sanctuary window.

The table joined the cross in the now fresh and bright looking sanctuary. The first of some new banners that will be rotated throughout the year were added to complete the wonderful new focal point of our worship. Volunteers lain, Alec and Roy did an amazing job on a very tight budget and we are very grateful for all they have done and the time and skill they have given. The large folding doors will now remain open for most of the time allowing all our community groups to be reminded that there is a God who loves and welcomes them. As for Peter and myself we are not allowed to have any more conversations or bright ideas for a while!

The table top had a ¼ removed from each end. It was then sanded to reveal what we believe to be oak. The excess wood was used to create our new cross.

BACK IN TIME in October

- 90 years ago On 17th 1933, physicist Albert Einstein arrived in the USA as a refugee from Nazi Germany.

- 60 years ago, on 15th 1963, the term 'Beatlemania' first appeared in the Daily Mirror newspaper in the UK. It described the intense, frenzied reaction of fans of the Beatles.
- 50 years ago, from 19th October 1973 to 17th March 1974, the 1973 Oil Crisis took place.

 OPEC suspended oil exports to nations supporting Israel in the Yom Kippur War.

 It led to major shortages and rationing in the UK, USA, Canada, Japan, Portugal, the Netherlands, Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) and South Africa.
- 40 years ago, on 5th October 1983 Lech Walesa, leader of the Solidarity movement in m Poland, (and later President of Poland) was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

A Bear called Paddington

65 years ago, on 14th October 1958, Michael Bond's book, *A Bear Called Paddington*, was published. It marked the debut of the lovable Paddington Bear, who is now a household name after appearing in two irresistible films.

Paddington starred in more than 20 books written by Bond, who died aged 91 in 2017. The original story was inspired by the author witnessing Jewish and British evacuee children passing through Reading station. Bond wanted the bear to have come from "darkest Africa", but was changed to Peru when his agent pointed out that there were no bears in Africa!

Many people have found Christian characteristics in the bespectacled, kind, red-hatted, innocent Paddington, who always tries to do the right thing but often gets into trouble as a result.

A stuffed toy Paddington Bear was chosen by British tunnellers as the first item to be passed to their French counterparts when the two sides of the Channel Tunnel came together in 1994. The books have been translated into 30 languages and have sold more than 30 million copies.

Paddington has also reached the very top of society. He joined the late Queen in one of her last public appearances – a brilliant comedy segment in the Platinum Party at Buckingham Palace on 4th June 2022, in which the Queen 'revealed' that she always carried a marmalade sandwich – Paddington's favourite food – in her handbag.

As we stay in Uganda for a longer period of time, we have been learning not just about what brings us happiness, but what we need to make us joyful and sustainable here. The big one for both of us is the love of being outdoors. Living in the city isn't easy at the best of times, but in Kampala the air pollution is so terrible and there are very few green spaces (and if they are around, you have to pay a lot for the luxury of using it)! We seem to crave space and greenery but finding it isn't always easy.

We were so blessed by Chloe's sister and brother in law who gifted us a tent in May. It has opened up opportunities to go away for a night or two at an affordable price. The girlies are slowly improving in the car for long distances and so we have started to learn to find joy in getting away for a night and refreshing ourselves. In our intense life of community living and work and people constantly, it's really important to find space to breathe. We recently went away to Queen Elizabeth Park and camped outside of the National Park. God blessed us incredibly, we got there in record time, we were the only people at the campsite so had the



pool to ourselves; we saw almost every animal possible without needing to pay for a safari as the animals decided to visit us on the road, and we felt rested. Sam got to cycle and enjoy the fresh air, the girls LOVED camping and Chloe was able to switch off! It was a short moment, just three and a half days, but it was truly a weekend of joy and blessing. We feel excited for our next adventure and encouraged that there are ways to make life sustainable here at an affordable price for our family.

As you read in our highlights, we are expecting another baby! We couldn't be happier!! As many of you know, it really wasn't easy getting pregnant with Zara-Grace and took around 3 years, lots of doctors, surgery and an ectopic pregnancy. So, to be blessed with a third baby feels like another miracle! The first trimester has not been easy for Chloe, until she reached 12 weeks and most recently, she has been struggling with pelvic and back pain which means some moments it's hard to walk! So please do pray for this pregnancy to get easier! We plan to head back to the UK in January for the birth. So thankful for the care from the NHS previously, so wanted to keep Mum and babe as safe as possible!

Cycling

A HUGE thank you to those of you who sponsored Sam to be able to attend the World Championships in August. It was an amazing experience, a great learning curve for both Sam and the cyclists and a wonderful opportunity to network for the Bike Park! The cyclists didn't win any race but enjoyed the experience and it was a good motivator for them to see how far they need to come in their training. It was so great to see Uganda represented and we hope and pray for more opportunities like this for riders in Uganda.

The Bike Park now has a playpark which is amazing! It feels so exciting to see everything starting to come together now. The space is being used by local children on a daily basis and has been built to last. It has a fort, obstacle course, climbing area and swings! We have recently had to close the area during school hours as children are sneaking off in lunch breaks to play! So thankful to Stockton Baptist Church for coming over for a week, fundraising and making it happen! (Photos in the next issue)

The Café is nearly complete and is looking beautiful. We had hoped to have opened by now, but we are still working on electricity and toilets, 2 quite expensive things! There are positive conversations happening with Bike Companies to be able to help open up the bike shop, but this may also delay the opening depending on timings for things to get here. The space has come to life and the pump track has the racing lines on it too! We had a wonderful friend Alex volunteer with us for a month. He built a skills area at the Bike Park which is very helpful for those novice riders as it gives them the opportunity to test different features before committing to a route.

Community

These past few months have been full of HUGE community BBQ's in the office/house. We celebrated Mary (Community Mentoring Supervisor) with a bridal shower as she is getting married this month and had her traditional wedding last month! We have learnt that so many of our friends look forward to a relaxed Friday evening BBQ full of music, food and dancing as it allows them to leave their stresses at home. Most recently we cooked 14kgs of rice and roasted 14kgs of chicken in an afternoon/evening and there was just no space left in the compound! Someone leaving Kampala very kindly donated a swing set and some kids games which has been a huge JOY to the children who come around. Our friends all seem to be giving birth this past few months, we are surrounded by baby boys which is wonderful!

Our tailoring project, the Dorcas Dress has been restructured and has been going from strength to strength. Fridays are full of women learning to tailor and they are doing incredibly well! New friendships have been formed because they met at Musizi Joy!

BIG GIVE is a new exciting opportunity for us at Musizi Joy Foundation. We are strategically trying to fundraise for covering core costs such as salaries for the year of 2024. We are still a little way off our pledge target. Using the link below, would you be able to help?

Wordsearch – St Luke Feast Day: 18th October

To St Luke, we owe a beautifully written gospel as well as the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician and faithful travelling companion to St Paul. Under house arrest near the end of his life Paul noted, 'only Luke is with me'. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ, and offers us moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than in any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner. His gospel also features more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners', who are all shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. In Acts, Luke skilfully links sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. He tells of how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.


