Following the all age celebration there will be a opportunity to receive Holy Communion in a fifteen minute said service for those who wish to remain.



The first-ever nativity scene

This Christmas, thousands of Nativity plays will be held around the UK. But who staged the very first one? It was St Francis of Assisi, and it was 800 years ago, in Greccio, Italy, on 25th December 1223.

Born into a wealthy family, Francis abandoned his noble inheritance when he became a Christian. Instead, he had turned to a life of great simplicity, in service to Christ's church.



He spent many hours meditating on the stories of the life of Christ, and even travelled to the Holy Land in 1219 and 1220, to see the various holy sites of Jesus's life. The sites deeply moved him, as they brought the Bible stories to vibrant life.

Back in Italy, in November of 1223, Francis was in Rome, and he had an idea. Why not share something of the inspiration of the Holy Land with his people here in Italy? Barely 50 miles to the north, in Greccio, he knew many people to whom he had been ministering for years. He could at least show them something of the simplicity of the birth of Jesus. And so it was that, two weeks before Christmas, Francis asked his friend, the Lord of Greccio, Giovanni Velita, to prepare a nearby cave with live animals and a hay-filled manger.

That cave, beside some rocky crags, became the venue of the very first ever Nativity scene. On Christmas 1223, when the people of Greccio attended Christmas Mass as usual, they were invited to 'come and see' the simple scene.

According to his biographer, Brother Thomas of Celano, Francis wanted people to see what Jesus had "suffered for lack of the necessities of a new-born babe, and how He lay in the manger between the ox and ass."

According to eyewitness accounts of the moment, fires lit the dark scene while crowds arrived at the spot carrying candles and torches. It was an instant success, and soon other communities were staging their own.

It is now a Franciscan hermitage and sanctuary which is open to visitors. Every year at Christmas, the people of Greccio stage a live, historical re-enactment of St Francis and the first Nativity scene.

Pope Francis has visited the spot twice: in 2016 and then in 2019, when he signed an apostolic letter on the importance of Nativity scenes.

The Story Behind the Hymn: Hark the Herald Angels Sing

Many of the carols we sing have a rich theological tradition, and "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing!" is no exception. It was written by Charles Wesley, who was an English Methodist leader and hymn writer. Wesley wrote over 6,000 hymns, more than any other male writer.

The first stanza describes the good news of the saviour's birth. God has sent the One who will reconcile the sinner back to Himself. Therefore, all the nations should rise and sing and proclaim the good news, which is Christ the King! The next stanza speaks to the mysticism of Christ's coming and the good news in it. The final stanza tells of the accomplishment of Christ and the power that it brings.

For well over two hundred years, "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" has been a Gospel-saturated anthem pointing people to the Saviour, loaded with rich theology.

As you sing carols this Christmas, take the time to think about the message of the songs and what they mean. Consider the words you are singing and the truths they proclaim about the Saviour you are worshipping.

The text, based on Luke 2:14, tells of an angelic chorus singing praises to God.

Hark the herald angels sing, Glory to the new born King

Peace on earth and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled.

Joyful all ye nations rise, join the triumph of the skies,

With the angelic host proclaim, "Christ is born in Bethlehem."

The singing of Christmas carols was abolished in England by the Puritan Parliament in 1649, under the leadership of the famous Oliver Cromwell. As a result of Parliament's ruling, Christmas hymns and carols were scarce between the late 17th and the early 18th Century in England. Charles Wesley's "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" was one of the few written during that period that became popular wherever Christians gathered during Advent. After Cromwell died in 1658 and the monarchy was soon restored, the former decision to prohibit the singing of Christmas carols was abandoned. Thus, hymns written to honour the birth of Jesus began to appear and have continued to this day.

Wesley's "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" is one of the most popular Christmas carols today, but both Wesley's words and tune have been changed. The first line of the hymn originally read, "Hark! how all the welkin rings, Glory to the King of Kings." They were changed in 1753 by George Whitefield, a famous English preacher. Wesley insisted that his hymn be sung to a slow, sombre, and "boring" religious tune. It wasn't until the words were paired with a more upbeat melody that it became popular. The current tune for this carol was composed by Mendelssohn, who himself was a Messianic Jew. The hymn that we now sing is the result of many alterations by numerous individuals and hymnal editorial committees.


HAVANT TREFOIL GUILD ASSOCIATION

WORLD WIDE

BACK IN TIME in December

800 years ago, on 25th December 1223 St Francis of Assisi created the first nativity scene, in Greccio, Italy, after visiting Jesus' birthplace in the Holy Land. It proved enormously popular and inspired other communities to stage their own nativity scenes.

250 years ago, on 16th December 1773 the Boston Tea Party took place in Massachusetts. American patriots boarded ships and threw chests of tea belonging to the British East India Company into Boston Harbour, as a protest against the British tax on tea.

200 years ago, on 23rd December 1823 the poem *The Night Before Christmas* was first published (anonymously) in the Sentinel newspapers in Troy, New York. It was written by Clement Clarke Moore.

175 years ago – on 19th December 1848 Emily Bronte, British novelist and poet, died of tuberculosis, aged 30. Best known for her only novel, *Wuthering Heights*.

100 years ago: on 6th December 1923 Ramsay MacDonald became the first Labour Prime Minister.

100 years ago on 31st December 1923 the BBC broadcast the chimes of Big Ben for the first time, to welcome in the New Year. The tradition continues to this day.

80 years ago, on 22nd December 1943 Beatrix Potter, children's writer and illustrator, died. She created animal characters including Peter Rabbit, Squirrel Nutkin, Mrs Tiggy-Winkle, Jemima Puddle-Duck, and many more.

75 years ago, on 24th December 1948 the first Midnight Mass to be televised was broadcast from St Patrick's Cathedral in New York City.

65 years ago, on 5th December 1958 Britain's first motorway, the Preston By-pass, was officially opened. (It is now part of the M6 and M55.)

60 years ago, on 21st December 1963 the Daleks made their first appearance on the British science fiction TV series *Doctor Who*.

50 years ago, on 21st December 1973 the Geneva Conference opened in Switzerland, aimed at finding a solution to the Arab-Israeli conflict. No agreement was reached, but Israel signed a military disengagement agreement with both Egypt and Syria in 1974.

30 years ago, on 30th December 1993 Israel and the Vatican City agreed to recognise each other and established diplomatic relations.

25 years ago, on 10th December 1998 the UN General Assembly listed anti-Semitism as a form of racism.

Also 25 years ago, on 10th December 1998 the Palestine Liberation Organisation voted to remove clauses in its charter that called for Israel's destruction.

20 years ago, on 1st December 2003 using a handheld mobile phone while driving became illegal in the UK.

10 years ago, on 5th December 2013 Nelson Mandela died. Winner of Nobel Peace Prize.

Wordsearch - The story of 'Silent Night'

This much-loved carol comes from Austria, where it was first sung as Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas 1818 approached, he asked the local schoolmaster, Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during the midnight mass. The carol went on to become loved world-wide; and the version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.

Beatrix Potter

80 years ago on 22nd December 1943, Beatrix Potter, the children's writer and illustrator, died. Her animal characters such as Peter Rabbit. Squirrel Nutkin, Mrs Tiggy-Winkle and Jemima Puddle-Duck brought her worldwide fame and made her loved by children around the world. She had enjoyed an upper-middle-class childhood, but it was also solitary. Instead of friends, she was given numerous pets and spent holidays in Scotland and the Lake District, where she learned to love landscape, flora and fauna. Beatrix Potter was in her thirties when she first self-published The Tale of Peter Rabbit in 1902. Its immense success meant that she began writing and illustrating children's books fulltime. In all, she wrote more than 60 books. She used the sales of her books and a legacy from an aunt in 1905 to buy Hill Top Farm in Near Sawrey, a village in the Lake District.



When in 1903 Peter Rabbit was made into a patented stuffed toy, he became the first fictional character to have this honour.
