REMEMBERING SALLY HONEYCHURCH



Sally (Mum) was born in Stockport to Alan and Constance Hobbs and was the eldest of four children. Her Dad, Alan, was an English teacher and in 1939 started work at Bay House School in Gosport so the family moved south to be by the sea. World events at the time meant the family were evacuated to Eastleigh but stayed together as her Mum, Constance, was an evacuation officer. After the war the family stayed in Chandlers Ford, later moving to Otterbourne.

Mum went to Nottingham University to study Economics and became treasurer of the conservative

association. It is fair to say that whist at university she lived life to the full. One fresher's week she had a bet with a friend that she couldn't have a different date every night of the week. That year Dad, John, was a fresher and decided with his friend they needed to join the conservative association – not for a love of politics but because they met in the ladys' college. Dad asked mum for a date – he was Friday in her bet week. She lost the bet as she didn't make it past Friday. They married on 1st August 1959 and Mum started teaching while dad finished studying.

After University, Dad went to work in industry as a management consultant, travelling the country with his work. Four children came along, born in four different houses in less than five years. As Dad said at Sarah's 18th birthday celebrations, 'that meant there were four different milkmen!' Taking a break from having children Mum and Dad built their own house in Derbyshire, moving the family into a static caravan on site while the house was being built. The building process wasn't helped by the three-day week and shortage of supplies in the early 1970s. This didn't deter them, and on many occasions, Mum was sent out in her long leather boots and short skirts to pick up building supplies which were hard to come by.

Family holidays during this time usually involved the caravan and long road trips to Cornwall, the Lake District and even one to Scotland.

In 1979, Dad was made redundant from Viners and, wanting to be his own boss, moved the family to the Isle of Wight where they brought a grocer's shop. With Dad working in the shop, Mum went back to full time teaching as a maths teacher at the newly built Medina High School. Outside of work Mum was active in the WI, becoming their President and writing and directing many pantomimes for them where she was usually cast as the villain. Always a performer, we have happy memories of her being 'Gandhi' on one of the carnival floats. She also joined a lady's vocal group, Harmony, and enjoyed performing with them, manged the church hall, was a member of the church choir, organised the annual summer show and was also an avid knitter. In her 'spare' time she would often take us all to Compton beach for us to do a spot of surfing while she enjoyed a moment's peace to read a book and drink a cup of coffee.

By the time Mum retired from teaching they had sold the shop. Never one to waste time, Mum soon found an empty shop in the village and persuaded the landlord that the building wasn't well kept but she would look after it for him if he let her run a charity shop from the premises and so Faith, Hope and Charity was founded. Initially this was a charity shop run for the church and with church volunteers but Mum soon made it into a real community venture. She was sad to hand over the reins when in December 2015 they moved to Havant. With dad's health declining it was important to be closer to family. They both briefly joined Havant Light Opera with Polly which they loved; their last show together was Yeoman of the Guard.

Family was always important to Mum. She loved her three younger siblings - Richard, Charles and Belinda - and was immensely proud of her four children, eight grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Mum didn't have any cousins of her own so was delighted that Dad had a large family. She also loved her wider family of 17 nephews and nieces, 24 great nephews and nieces, 47 great, great nephews and nieces, and 2 great, great, great nephews and nieces! A visit to Cornwall would always mean meeting lots of family.

Mum and Dad brought us all up to believe that we could achieve anything we wanted to with our lives and mum always thought that we were all 'the best' at whatever we did. She was delighted when Sarah completed her doctorate, told everyone who would listen that Nick was the brightest mathematician she had ever taught, was convinced that Polly, only two months after being ordained deacon, had become a bishop and that Lucy is in charge of the National Trust for the whole of Cornwall. Whilst the last two of those may not be true what is true is that mum was immensely proud of us all.

Right until the end, Mum was fiercely independent and insisted on doing everything for herself. We are grateful that she accepted Sonia as her carer, someone who mum came to love and respect and who enabled mum to stay in her own home for as long as possible. Sarah read the poem 'Warning' by Jenny Joseph in which it states that she will wear purple. Mum did grow old and wore purple. (as did guests at her funeral.) Despite the family's efforts, she was also a terrible hoarder - with her collection of pewter and Britannia metal teapots!

When Dad died in December 2022, Mum lost the love of her life. On the night Mum died, the skies across the country were lit up with the Northern Lights as Dad was clearly throwing a great party for her arrival. Mum, we all miss you.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is an ecumenical Christian observance in the Christian calendar that is celebrated internationally. In the Northern Hemisphere it is observed in January and between Ascension Day and Pentecost in the Southern Hemisphere. The theme for 2025 has been chosen by the community of Bose, an ecumenical monastery of brothers and sisters in northern Italy is, "**Do you believe this?**"

Holocaust Memorial Day is particularly significant in 2025. Monday 27th January marks the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp.

How the New Year and Resolutions began

January 1st was not always the start of a New Year. The Babylonians began their New Year on 23rd March. For them, it was a logical choice, as with the arrival of Spring, crops were being planted, and a new cycle of life was beginning.

For centuries the Romans agreed with them, but they chose 1st March for New Year. It was the Romans who brought in the idea of making resolutions at New Year, mostly along the lines of acting more noble, and doing good to others.

Then in 46BC Julius Caesar changed the Roman Empire's calendar. His new Julian calendar realigned the year to the sun, and also began on 1st January. Caesar wanted to honour Janus, the two-faced god who looks backwards into the old year and forward into the new. January 1st didn't have any astronomical or agricultural significance; it was just a random date selected by Caesar.

Reading the Bible in church

'He read in their hearing all the words of the Book of the Covenant, which had been found in the temple of the Lord.' 2 Kings 23:2

A friend was unexpectedly asked to read at a service as someone was unwell. He was caught just as he came in the church! Most of us like to look over a reading first and find the meaning of the passage. Some Bible readings are challenging, with difficult names of places and people. If it makes you feel better, no-one else knows how to pronounce these either, because there is no one around from Bible times!

It is not nice to be given a reading at the last minute, but then not good for the minister to suddenly get let down. To tell you the truth I have never liked reading, as it makes me dreadfully nervous. I prefer to preach or lead than read.

People worry about reading in church. Some of them would happily talk to a class of children or a boardroom, but there is something about church which is different. Perhaps we expect too much of ourselves. The best reading I ever heard in church was by a non-church goer. He did not know the reading, so he put a different emphasis on the passage. If you are reluctant, why not slip into church and give it a trial on a Saturday, when no-one is around?

Reading in church is a genuine ministry and is vital. It is important to give it our best try, as a way of learning about our faith. The Bible is meant to be heard as well as read.

SAM'S JOURNEY

My desire is to help everyone that wishes to lose weight, but in particular I would like to help new mums, I know how difficult it can be to lose weight in order to get pregnant and the struggles women face after giving birth.

Here's how I know

I first started my Slimming World journey back in 2017 – My body had changed so much after trying for a baby via IVF, I was also transitioning from shift work to regular hours which meant I was able to commit to attending a Slimming World group, I was so excited to be able to do this!

I didn't have a positive experience when I first joined the group, I only ever lost around ½ a stone, I was doing everything by the book and just

couldn't understand it. I had become more active, doing more cycling and running so I felt a little disheartened.

I ended up returning to shift work in 2018 so I was unable to commit to my Slimming World group. This is when I realised I had to focus on my fertility journey. I had several baby losses and then Covid hit, it was such a difficult time.

Hormones had such an impact on my body, I had had seven failed IVF rounds, which included three losses – it was just two days after my 51st birthday I decided that losing weight for my final round of IVF was the way forward. I joined Slimming World at The Stride Centre, Warblington where I met a lovely consultant called Martin. This time I started losing the weight, I also learnt a very valuable life lesson – Never judge a book by its cover. This may sound clichéd but it's so true, I thought Martin appeared overweight so I wasn't convinced by him. However, he had lost a staggering 15 stone and was a true inspiration.

I started to feel and see a difference in my body, I had more energy, more focus and my family and friends started to see a difference which really spurred me on. In four months I had lost 1st 9.5lbs so I was ready to embark on my IVF journey again, sadly this was unsuccessful but I continued going to the group and it became about looking good for a holiday!

My desire to become a mother didn't disappear, and without telling anyone I went to Cyprus for another round of IVF which was successful! I had lost 2st 2lbs in the lead up to this trip which I'm utterly convinced helped me on my journey.

I continued to attend Slimming World whilst pregnant and at 31 weeks my gorgeous twin girls were born; after ten days I had lost all of my baby weight and more. In total I lost 4st and 3lbs and have continued to stay within my target range. My girls are now 2 years old and 3 months old.

My Slimming World journey has been amazing on both sides of motherhood, it has inspired me to be the best version of me and I want to inspire people the way Martin and all the supportive members of my Slimming World group inspired me.

If my story has inspired you and you would like me to help you on your journey then please consider joining one of my groups, even if it starts with just a conversation – small steps can lead to big changes.



I run a group at St Nicholas Church, Belmont Grove, Bedhampton on a Saturday morning at 7.45am and 9.15am and also run another group at St Michaels & All Angels Church, Dunsbury Way, Leigh Park on a Thursday evening at 5.30pm and 7.00pm.

Wordsearch – Gifts of the Wise Men

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? One Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote the much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple. Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people. The Wise Men were the very first Gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had!

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BACK IN TIME in January

- 150 years ago on 14th January 1875, Albert Schweitzer, German theologian, philosopher, physician, musicologist, writer and humanitarian, was born. He won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1952.
- 125 years ago on 14th January 1900, the premiere of Italian composer Giacomo Puccini's opera *Tosca*, took place in Rome.
- 100 years ago, on 3rd January 1925, Benito Mussolini declared himself dictator of Italy.
- 90 years ago, on 8th January 1935, Elvis Presley ('The King') was born. An American rock and roll singer, guitarist and actor, he died in 1977.
- 80 years ago, on 16th January 1945, Adolf Hitler took up residence in the Fuhrerbunker, a subterranean bunker complex in the garden of the Reich Chancellery in Berlin. It became the headquarters of the Nazi regime, and he remained there for the rest of his life. He committed suicide there in April 1945.
- 80 years ago, on 27th January 1945, the Soviet Red Army liberated Auschwitz Concentration Camp in southern Poland. It was the largest Nazi concentration camp and at least 1.1 million prisoners died there.
- 75 years ago, on 6th January 1950, the UK officially recognised the Republic of China and established diplomatic relations.
- 75 years ago, on 23rd January 1950, Israel declared Jerusalem was its capital city. Palestine also claims it as its capital.
- 70 years ago, US President Dwight D Eisenhower gave the first televised presidential news conference. It was filmed in the morning and broadcast that evening. The first live conference was given by John F Kennedy in Jan 1961.
- 60 years ago, on 4th January 1960, T S Eliot, American-born British poet, playwright, literary critic and editor died. He won the 1948 Nobel Prize for Literature.
- 60 years ago on 24th January 1965, Winston Churchill died. He was Prime Minister 1940-45 and again in 1955, and one of the greatest wartime leaders of the 20th century. He was named as 'the greatest Briton of all time.' He won the 1953 Nobel Prize for Literature "for his mastery of historical and biographical description as well as for brilliant oratory in defending exalted human values."

50 years ago on 20th January 1974, Bob Dylan's album *Blood on the Tracks* was released.

- 40 years ago on 1st January 1985, the first mobile phone call in the UK was made by the comedian Ernie Wise. He rang Vodafone's head office in Newbury from St Katherine's Docks in London.
- 40 years ago, on 23rd January 1985, a debate from the House of Lords was televised live for the first time.
- 30 years ago on 1st January 1995, the World Trade Organisation was established.
- 25 years ago, on 1st January 2000, the calendar switched over to the year 2000, with no major computer problems from the Y2K 'Millennium Bug'.

- 25 years ago, on 5th January 2000, Steve Jobs announced that he had again become the CEO of Apple Computer. (He had been ousted from the job in 1985.)
- 25 years ago, on 13th January 2000, Bill Gates announced he was stepping down as chief executive of Microsoft. Company president Steve Ballmer took over, while Gates remained as chairman and chief software architect.
- 15 years ago, on 4th January 2010, the Burj Khalifa in Dubai opened. It is the world's tallest structure, standing 2,722 feet (829.8 metres.)
- 15 years ago, on 12th January 2010, the Haiti earthquake took place. The capital, Port-au-Prince, was devastated and at least 100,000 people were killed and buried in mass graves.
- 10 years ago, on 7th January 2015, the Charlie Hebdo shooting in Paris took place. Two Muslim brothers forced their way into the offices and opened fire. 12 people were killed and 11 injured.

Remembering TS Eliot – author of The Wasteland

Sixty years ago, on 4th January 1965, T S Eliot, American-born British poet, playwright, literary critic and editor, died. He won the 1948 Nobel Prize for Literature.

Born in 1888 in St Louis, Missouri, his family were prominent Unitarians, with roots in Boston. However, he had a Roman Catholic nanny, of whom he was very fond, and who took him to her church. This may have had some bearing on his converting to Anglicanism in 1927, the year he became a British citizen. He was baptised and confirmed secretly in Oxfordshire, saying he hated spectacular conversions.

He identified as Anglo-Catholic, saying he was "classicist in literature, royalist in politics, and anglo-catholic in religion". Much later he said he combined "a Catholic cast of mind, a Calvinist heritage and a Puritanical temperament".

Eliot married twice but had no children. His first wife was Vivienne Haigh-Wood, who he married in 1915 – the year that his first "professional" poem, *The Love Song of J Alfred Prufrock*, was published. But the marriage was fraught, because his wife had mental problems and eventually went into an asylum. They separated in 1933. His second wife was his much younger secretary Esme, whom he married in 1957.

Eliot lived through two world wars but remained optimistic through his Christianity. He wrote *The Waste Land* in 1923 and *The Four Quartets* were published in 1941 after he became British and an Anglican. He died in London and is buried in Somerset. There is a plaque in his memory in Poets' Corner in Westminster Abbey.

Eliot is also known for his collection of whimsical poems *Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats* (1939), about feline psychology and sociology. They formed the basis of Andrew Lloyd Webber's musical '*Cats*'. Among his plays is '*Murder in the Cathedral*'.



DECEMBER EVENTS

On Tuesday 10 December our MU branch members were joined by friends from Trefoil and gathered at The Castle in Rowlands Castle for our Christmas lunch.
